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### MESSINGER ANNOUNCES FORMATION OF COMMUNITY ACCESS ORGANIZATION TO AD-MINISTER PUBLIC ACCESS CABLE CHANNELS

Several months after Manhattan Borough President Ruth Messinger appointed a seven-member initial board of directors to administer Manhattan's four public access channels, the Borough President and the CAO's chair Gretchen Dykstra announce today that the Manhattan Community Access Organization has ratified its by-laws and has filed for incorporation.

The CAO's central charge is to administer and manage all the public access channels of the cable television systems in Manhattan – currently Paragon and Manhattan cable system – and oversee the use of facilities, equipment, supplies, services and other support made available for programming.

Prior to ratifying its by-laws, the Board met with many local public access producer groups, government officials and the Time-Warner company. "I think this small group of talented and dedicated individuals has done an extraordinary job of putting together the most extensive and thoughtful set of by-laws to govern such

an organization. From the outset, I stressed to them that I wanted an open and independent board and organization. I am very pleased to say they took my charge to heart," said the Borough President.

Highlights of the CAD's by-laws include:

\* A 19-member board, representing the ethnic, economic and geographical diversity of Manhattan will, one year after the CAO begins training sessions for public access producers, include six slots reserved for active public access producers.

\* The establishment of an Advisory Nominating Committee, to recommend individuals for the six public access producer slots on the Board.

\* Tough prohibitions against conflicts of interest, ensuring the independence and integrity of the Board.

\* In addition to its Annual Meeting the Board will hold at least two meetings each year that will be open to the public.

CAO's goals include:

\* A training program that will assist and train individuals and community groups on how to use public access television. The program will include advice on how to plan and produce programming for public access channel, instruction on how to use equipment and production facilities creatively and efficiently, and how to maximize channel time.

\* An extensive outreach program that will encourage newcomers and beginners to participate in the training sessions. Likewise, outreach to experienced producers to assist in setting the organization's goals and policies.

\* A charge to develop additional funding resources to expand and promote public access television.

The Manhattan CAO unlike its counterparts in the other boroughs is in a unique situation since Manhattan has a history of public access television while the others do not.

"There are very high expectations for the Manhattan CAO. There is a long history of public access television here and people have very strong opinions about how the CAO should operate. Current users and future public access producers will be very impressed with the openness of this organization," said Ms. Messinger.

Under the terms of the agreement between the City and Time-Warner, the CAO will receive a capital grant of 5.35 million to be used for facilities and equipment. At this time, that money is held in escrow by the Borough President until the State Cable Commission on Television (CCT) – which has jurisdiction over cable issues – authorizes its disbursement. The CAO is required to submit to the Borough President and the CCT a capital expenditure plan, detailing how the CAO intends to spend these capital funds.

In addition to the capital grant, Time-Warner is required to pay the CAO \$3 per subscriber per year to assist in defraying operating costs. This money will

also be used to make grants to assist public access producers and support programming initiatives of the CAO.
