



Appellant is now before the Court on a Petition for Rehearing. According to Rule 3.14, *Rules of the Court of Criminal Appeals*, Title 22, Ch. 18, App. (2018), a Petition for Rehearing shall be filed for two reasons only:

- (1) Some question decisive of the case and duly submitted by the attorney of record has been overlooked by the Court, or
- (2) The decision is in conflict with an express statute or controlling decision to which the attention of this Court was not called either in the brief or in oral argument.

*Id.*


Appellant contends that this Court's decision overlooked questions decisive of the issue he raised in Proposition Five including "binding precedent" and "evidence." Reviewing Appellant's allegations pursuant to Rule 3.14(B)(1), we find that Appellant is not entitled to rehearing as he has not shown that this Court overlooked some question decisive of the case and duly submitted by the attorney of record.<sup>1</sup> Based upon the foregoing, this Petition for Rehearing is **DENIED**. The Clerk of this Court is ordered to issue the mandate forthwith.

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
