Petitioner's Motion for Extension of Time

To File Petition for Writ of Certiorari

Comes now Petitioner, Justin Cornell, pro se, (Cornell, Accused, Defendant) to humbly request a sixty (60) day extension of time to file a petition for Writ of Certiorari. The writ is being sought for a judgment by the Virginia Supreme Court (Appendix A), over which this Court has jurisdiction pursuant to 28 USC § 1257 and the Supreme Court Rules 10(b) and 10(c).

In support of this request petitioner states the following:

1. Cornell is incarcerated in Greenville Correctional Center and as an inmate has very limited access to the law library, no more than seven and one half (7.5) hours per week due to non-compliance with Lindquist v. Idaho State Board of Corrections, and Bounds v. Smith, decided by this Court.
2. Hiring counsel for representation is beyond petitioner's financial means.
3. Cornell has no experience with the legal system.
4. The precise nature of the issues at hand, the Commonwealth's Motion to Exclude Evidence of Third-Party Guilt, has proven difficult to research. Specifically in other State's courts of last resort as the law library does


not keep copies of cases from other States, nor does GRCC allow inmates access to a legal search engine (LexisNexis, Westlaw), but instead requires inmates to make their requests to an inmate with no legal training, acting as a clerk who can access the computer, and only then may he request an out-of-state case be printed and delivered by the supervisor; a process known to take 2-4 weeks.

5. Typing Services are not available.

6. Typewriters are not sufficiently supplied with ribbons to support inmate preparation of court documents.

The petitioner prays this Court grant the request for time extension due to the foregoing reasons with apologies. The accused further prays for any other relief which the Court may deem just and proper under these circumstances.
