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1 JUDGE FOR THE RECORD

2	Our official interpreter in the Tamil language is appearing through the
3	SOSi interpretation services, and her code for today is 6161573.
4	JUDGE TO INTERPRETER
5	To our interpreter, do you swear or affirm to translate and interpret
6	accurately and correctly from the English to the Tamil, Tamil to the English, to the best
7	of your ability?
8	INTERPRETER TO JUDGE
9	Yes, I do, Your Honor.
10	JUDGE TO INTERPRETER
11	Thank you.
12	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
13	And then through our interpreter to the respondent, sir, good morning.
14	What language do you speak and understand the best?
15	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
16	Tamil.
17	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
18	And can you hear the interpreter clearly through the headphones?
19	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
20	Yes, Your Honor.
21	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
22	And is she speaking your language?
23	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
24	Yes, Your Honor.
25	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM

1 All right.

2 JUDGE FOR THE RECORD

3	This is Immigration Judge Henry Ipema, I-P-E-M-A. I am presiding over
4	the detained docket of the Otay Mesa, California, Immigration Court. Today's date is
5	March 17, 2017. This next case is a credible fear review in file
6	respondent's name is Vijayakumar Thurassigiam. And I'm going to spell it for the
7	record. V-I-J-A-Y-A-K-U-M-A-R, and last name, T-H-U-R-A-I-S-S-I-G-I-A-M [sic]. The
8	respondent is present, and he does not appear to be accompanied by any individual.
9	The Government has sent an observer to the proceedings.
10	JUDGE TO MR. WITIES
11	And, counsel, if you want to state your name for the record?
12	MR. WITIES TO JUDGE
13	I'm senior attorney Robert Wities.
14	JUDGE TO MR. WITIES
15	Thank you.
16	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
17	And to the respondent, sir, would you please stand and raise your right
18	hand? Sir, do you swear or affirm to tell the whole truth and nothing but the truth?
19	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
20	l do speak only truth.
21	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
22	Thank you. Please be seated. And state your full and true name for the
23	record.
24	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE

25 Thurassigiam, Vijayakumar.

1 JUDGE FOR THE RECORD

We note for the record that the respondent is being provided a closed hearing. There are no other applicants in the courtroom, only those directly associated with the respondent's hearing, the Court, the Government observer, the interpreter, and an officer, and of course the respondent.

6 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM

So to the respondent, the Immigration Officer has found that you are
removable from the United States. The Asylum Officer has determined that you do not
have a credible fear of persecution or torture. You asked for an Immigration Judge to
review the Asylum Officer's determination.

11 MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE

12 Yes, Your Honor.

13 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM

And we are about to conduct that review. But please understand that the Court has no authority in your case beyond this review. Now, sir, there is no one else in the courtroom, but did you have anyone, such as an attorney or a family member or a

17 friend, with you here today?

18 MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE

19 No, Your Honor.

20 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM

The regulations allow for a respondent to consult with an attorney or other person prior to this review. However, for this review, the regulations provide no role for an attorney or other person, nor for a continuance for an attorney or attorney preparation. The regulations do, however, require that this review be conducted expeditiously following the interview. Therefore, let me ask you, sir, do you remember

1	being interviewed by an Asylum Officer?
2	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
3	Yes, I do.
4	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
5	Do you agree that, for purposes of the interview, you were placed under
6	oath to tell the truth?
7	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
8	Yes, Your Honor. Yes, I do, Your Honor.
9	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
10	And did you tell the truth to the officer?
11	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
12	Yes, Your Honor.
13	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
14	Sir, I have reviewed the paperwork from the credible fear interview. And
15	I'm going to read to you now the officer's summary. So just listen closely as it is
16	translated for you. It says you indicated that you are fearful of returning to Sri Lanka
17	because you believe you will be beaten up and that you do not feel safe there.
18	INTERPRETER TO JUDGE
19	The interpreter
20	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
21	And that you do not feel safe there. You testified that you were taken by
22	men and beaten, and awoke one day
23	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
24	(Untranslated.)
25	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM

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March 17, 2017

1	Sir, just listen. And awoke one day later in the hospital. You do not know
2	who these individuals are or why they beat you. You testified that you were working on
3	your farm when these men came in a van, blindfolded you, and took you away and beat
4	you. You do not know if the police or other government entities are willing or able to
5	protect you because you did not report this incident to the authorities. Although you do
6	not know who beat you or why you were beaten, you are fearful of returning to Sri
7	Lanka. So, sir, is that a fair summary of what you told the officer?
8	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
9	Yes, Your Honor. It's truth.
10	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
11	Okay. Is there anything that you would like to say for purposes of this
12	review here today?
13	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
14	Yes. We would like to continue the review, sir.
15	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
16	All right, sir. Well, I have read the officer's report, and I am required to
17	review the interview that took place before the officer. It appears that you agree with
18	the summary of the information, but I wanted to know if there was anything that you
19	would like to tell me for purposes of the review.
20	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
21	Yes.
22	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
23	Go ahead, sir.
24	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
25	If I go back to Sri Lanka, they will beat me and they would kill me. They

1 were, they were threatening me, they were beating me, and they, they told me that they

2 would kill me. That's what they did to me. And I don't want to go to Sri Lanka.

3 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM

Sir, the officer found you to be a credible applicant. So the officer found
that when you related your story, you did so in a truthful manner. And when I review the
interview, there is no reason to reach a different conclusion.

7 INTERPRETER TO JUDGE

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Interpreter needs repetition, Your Honor.

9 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM

10 There is no reason to reach a different conclusion. So in other words, you 11 were found to be a credible witness. There's no reason to doubt your fear of return for 12 the reasons you stated, or that you were beaten on this occasion. Being truthful, 13 however, does not necessarily result in a positive determination in your case. In your 14 case, the officer very specifically analyzed the information and found no testimony that 15 you were or would be harmed on account of race, religion, nationality, membership in a 16 particular social group, or political opinion. This does seem to follow the information 17 that you did not know who these individuals were or why they were doing this to you. 18 Also, with respect to the issue of torture, the officer, in part, noted that this does not 19 appear to have been on the instigation of or by a public official or other person acting in 20 an official capacity. The officer noted that you had not reported the incident to the 21 police, so there was no basis to conclude that the police or authorities would acquiesce 22 to any harm against you. And these are issues that relate directly to the officer's ability 23 to find a positive credible fear in your case. As it did not appear that the information you 24 gave offered any showing of past or future harm on account of one of the five grounds 25 noted, and also, in part, because it did not appear that the authorities of your country

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1 were in any way behind or would permit the harm against you were you to return, the 2 officer had to reach the conclusion that you did not show a reasonable fear of 3 persecution or torture. But if there was something more that you wanted to say about 4 that reasoning, please do so, sir. 5 MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE 6 If they take me, they would, they, they can do whatever they want, but 7 nobody would be able to find out. So please, I don't want to go back. 8 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM 9 But, sir, about the specific reasoning that the officer included in the report 10 and which I just summarized for you, did you have anything in particular to say about 11 that reasoning? 12 MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE 13 In, in which one? 14 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM 15 Sir, I explained to you the officer's reasoning. Was there anything further 16 that you wanted to say about that? 17 MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE 18 They, they were telling me that they would shoot me and they would kill 19 me. That's what they kept on repeating, and they, they were beating me. They were 20 like in a -- they took almost five hours to threaten me and beat me. I found out only 21 about that when I opened my eyes in the hospital. 22 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM 23 You had indicated to the officer that you did not know who these 24 individuals were or why they were doing this to you. Is that true? 25 MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE

1 Yes, sir. 2 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM 3 And you never reported to the police, correct? 4 MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE 5 Yes, Your Honor, I did not. 6 JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM 7 Again, sir, I have no reason to doubt your subjective fear of return. But 8 upon de novo review of the Asylum Officer's determination, I must find as follows. First,

9 the Asylum Officer appears to have done a diligent job of attempting to obtain and 10 record the relevant information. Second, the officer reached the proper conclusion in 11 the context of controlling law for the reasons articulated. In other words, anyone could 12 understand how difficult a situation this must have been for you and how you can still 13 have fear. But considering all the circumstances, it does not qualify for a reasonable 14 fear of persecution as defined under the law or of torture as defined under the law. So 15 the decision of the Asylum Officer, finding no credible fear of persecution or torture, 16 must be affirmed. And the record is returned to the Department of Homeland Security. 17 Now, sir, you are being served with a copy of the decision. Regulations provide no 18 appeal of the decision. However, you may request the Department of Homeland 19 Security to reconsider its determination, and you are also encouraged to talk to the 20 Department of Homeland Security about any other options that may be available to you 21 in the discretion of the Department of Homeland Security, including humanitarian parole 22 or deferred action of any removal order or any collateral visa. But as I indicated to you 23 before, I do not have authority over that, only authority over the review. And it does 24 appear that the officer reached the correct conclusion based on the information 25 provided. Thank you to the respondent.

2	To our interpreter.
3	JUDGE TO MR. WITIES
4	To Government Counsel present.
5	JUDGE TO OFFICER
6	And also to our officer.
7	MR. THURASSIGIAM TO JUDGE
8	I, I don't want Sri Lanka. I don't want Sri Lanka.
9	JUDGE TO MR. THURASSIGIAM
10	Yes, I understand, sir. You were provided with the opportunity to express
11	your concerns of return to Sri Lanka. It does appear that subjectively you have a fear.
12	But under the law, it does not qualify for further proceedings. Thank you, sir.
