I.

JURISDICTION

Applicant (Williams) appealed the Western District Court's  
decision to deny him relief into the Fifth Circuit Court of  
Appeals which was denied on February 25, 2019. Williams now  
appeals to this Honorable Court. This Court has jurisdiction

pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §1257(a) as Williams is appealing a final judgment out of the United States Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals juxtaposed with Supreme Court Rule 30.3.

## II. SPECIFICS

Williams is an inmate at the Clements Unit in Potter County, Texas pursuant to his conviction for delivery of a controlled substance; to wit: cocaine, in a school zone (habitual) out of the 19<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Court where he was sentenced to a 25-99 or life sentence of penal servitude in cause no.: W-17-CA-132.

As a Texas prisoner, access to the unit law library is limited, at best to two hours per day, five days a week, ten hours a week. giving the nature of the issues now ripe for appeal, vast research is required.

It should be noted that legal research at the Clements unit is arduous, restrictive, and time intensive. E.g., the last Supreme Court volume "on the shelf" is the 125<sup>th</sup>, (2005). Beyond this, an inmate must shepardize cases which nets a page of case cites, received the following day, which, if beyond the confines of "the shelf," the law library allows one to electronically order up to three of those cases, also received the following day. If these cases fail to meet the needs of the researcher, he may order three more cases, received the following day, on and on.

Moreover, Williams has elicited the assistance of a fellow inmate. See In re Bonilla, 424 S.W. 3d 528 (2014) (The State of Texas allows "jailhouse lawyers" with an inmate helping inmates follow).

policy. Regardless, law library officials cannot excuse inmates from work or school to have legal visits; therefore, giving that Williams and his assistant both work for the prison, at different and conflicting hours, they are limited to two, two-hour sessions per week. The totality of the circumstances require Williams to move the Court to enlarge his time in order to perfect his appeal.

Williams understands that time extensions are disfavored; however, Williams' restraints are numerous and formidable; therefore, he requests the Court's patience and the Court's understanding that he moves in good faith.

Williams prays this Honorable Court will grant him an additional sixty (60) days to perfect his writ of certiorari so as to better his chances for review.

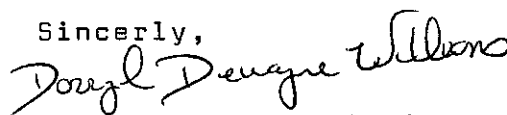
