

Petitioner-Appellant Robert Allen Stanford, pro se, hereby requests an extension of 60 days to file his Writ of Certiorari, and submits the following extraordinary circumstances in support thereof.

Jurisdiction

The judgment of the court of appeals was entered on May 16, 2019, and a request for rehearing, rehearing en banc, was denied on June 14, 2019. Petitioner's current deadline for filing a Writ of Certiorari in this Court is September 12, 2019.

The jurisdiction of this Court rests on 28 U.S.C. 1254(1).

Statement of the Case

This appeal concerns a claim in the amount of \$18.5 billion brought under the Federal Tort Claim Act, 28 U.S.C. 1346, 2671-2680, and its enumerated exceptions, involving an extraordinary (extraterritorial), extra-statutory overreach on the part of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC); an unconstitutional civil enforcement action that caused the destruction of a global financial services company, and great financial harm to its owner, the Petitioner-Appellant, as well as thousands of his clients around the world. For the past ten years, the SEC has avoided accountability in this matter via an ad hoc application of the sovereign immunity doctrine that was never considered by Congress, and has never been analyzed by this Court.

Request for Extension of 60 days

Because of the complexity of this civil enforcement action, which involves violations of the Fourth and Fifth Amendments to the U.S. Constitution, United States and foreign law, coupled with the fact that the Petitioner-Appellant is proceeding pro se -from a maximum security penitentiary where the almost daily acts of violence result in periods of institution lockdown, when all work on this litigation must cease, he respectfully requests an additional 60 days, to November 9, 2019, to prepare and file his Writ of Certiorari in this Court.
