

I, Molly Ann Mahany, Petitioner, *pro se*, hereinafter "the Petitioner," makes this Affidavit in support of her Motion for Leave to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis*. The Petitioner attests that the assertions herein are true, accurate, and correct, to the best of her knowledge, information, recollection, and belief:

She respectfully requests that this Motion be granted for the reasons, in part, to follow:

1. The Petitioner has long been subjected to Section 1983 violations, by the afore-named Respondents.

2. Having been deprived of the police protection, due process, access to courts, law enforcement, & crime victim's advocacy, to which she has always been due and the deprivation of which is &/or was somehow sometimes justified via the false evidence herein, all of the Petitioner's assets, resources, and entitlements were ultimately illegally and impermissibly seized, and thereafter kept, conveyed, &/or otherwise distributed by third parties.

3. Although the Petitioner has routinely sought the return of &/or restitution for her stolen properties and assets, etc., she has yet to be afforded any means of legal redress therefore.

4. In fact, and although the Petitioner essentially could *not* be more victimized, the Respondents, the Courts, et al., have yet to even recognize that the Petitioner is a *crime victim*.

5. As such, the Petitioner, alone, has wholly financed attempting to replace, restore, repair, &/or otherwise re-acquire what was, prior to being illegally seized, the sum total of forty years of arduous work.

6. Some of these expenses have caused the Petitioner to incur substantial credit card debt.

7. The Respondent's Section 1983 violations, in mere minimal part alone, have also destroyed, and do now continue to destroy, the Petitioner's credit.

8. Somewhat recently, as she has long been deprived of every available avenue of legal recourse &/or redress for said Section 1983 violations, the Petitioner had to pay \$ 2,000.00 just to repair the resultant damage to her credit, as much as her credit is able to be repaired at this point, despite her lack of legal accountability for all of the damage thereto.

9. Furthermore, the Petitioner's vehicle has been vandalized at least seven or eight times.

10. Some of said acts were committed while the Petitioner's children were were sometimes stranded at night and in parts unknown, after which the Petitioner, alone, financed the tow to a garage, the repairs themselves, and any necessary cab/uber fares for herself and her children in the interim, etc..

11. Unable to procure a police report documenting the commission of such acts, as well as numerous other crimes committed against the Petitioner, her property, her livelihood, her children, et al., the Petitioner has yet to receive any such recompense therefore from her insurance companies.

12. The Respondent's Section 1983 violations also empowered an unknown third party to cash in the Petitioner's whole life insurance policy and obtain the cash value thereof, all without the Petitioner's knowledge, consent, &/or permission to so do.

13. The Respondent's Section 1983 violations have further empowered, if not outright encouraged, various third parties to steal, destroy, fraudulently convey, &/or otherwise pilfer well over \$ 300,000.00 of the Petitioner's personal property, one of her vehicles, the Petitioner's business, her sources of income, and three pieces of her real property, which were either destroyed or fraudulently conveyed, etc..

14. The Petitioner has no health insurance, and pays all medical & dental expenses out of pocket, because the Section 1983 violations herein.

15. As such, the Petitioner lives on a small amount of retirement income & the income from an annuity.

16. The Petitioner has substantial debts, which she primarily incurred as a result of said Section 1983 violations, themselves, as well as the costs incurred by way of her ongoing efforts to procure some measure of just resolution to the criminal matter herein.

17. Several weeks ago, the Petitioner was again denied employment due to the false evidence created and disseminated by the Respondents herein.

18. At this point, the Petitioner would find it far easier, and far less personally intrusive, to simply pay the filing fee of \$ 300.00, particularly given that she has already lost millions of dollars because of these ongoing, albeit as yet unacknowledged, crimes.


