Dear Mr. Jerdan:

Please be advised that it has come to my attention that you may have not received a copy of the enclosed order denying your petition for certification. Please accept my apology for this oversight. With this denial, the services of this office on this particular appeal are at the end. However, you may be eligible to pursue your case in Federal Court.

If you believe your federal constitutional rights have been violated, you can write your own "pro se" Petition for Certiorari asking the United States Supreme Court to review your case. In your Petition, you would have to show that your federal constitutional rights have been violated, and that you raised those constitutional issues in the New Jersey state courts. Bear in mind that the United States Supreme Court agrees to review a very small percentage of the petitions it receives. If you wish to pursue this course of action, you must file your Petition no later than 90 days from the date on the enclosed Order. Since we have already sent you copies of your transcripts, briefs, appendix and decisions, you have all the documents that you will need.

You could also proceed by filing a pro se petition for habeas corpus with the New Jersey Federal District Court. I have enclosed documents containing some information regarding this option. I wish you success with whatever action you choose to take from this point.
