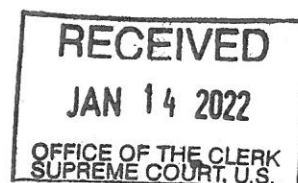

The District Court's Order denying application to proceed in forma pauperis and dismissing the case is attached hereto as Exhibit 1. The Eleventh Circuit's Order of Denial of Emergency Motion For Protective Order and Injunction is attached hereto as Exhibit 2. The docket number in the United States District Court For The Southern District of Florida is 1:21-cv-23821-BB and the docket number for the United States Court of Appeals For The Eleventh Circuit is 21-13913. In addition, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina's law degree diploma from Emory University School of Law is attached hereto as Exhibit 3. Next, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina's law school transcript from Emory University School of Law is attached hereto as Exhibit 4. Finally, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina's college transcript from the University of Florida is attached hereto as Exhibit 5.

JURISDICTION

On or about November 2, 2021, the District Court denied Petitioner's application to proceed in forma pauperis dismissing the case. Ex. 1. On or about November 8, 2021, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina filed Notice of Appeal with the District Court. On or about November 17, 2021, the Clerk of Court for the Eleventh Circuit received Petitioner's Appellant Brief. On or about December 10, 2021, Respondent Florida Bar sent Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina a letter intimidating and threatening him with investigation and prosecution for unauthorized practice of law. On or about December 13, 2021, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina filed Emergency Motion For Protective Order Restraining Appellees And Motion For Injunction. On or about December 27, 2021, the Eleventh Circuit denied the motion for protective and injunctive relief. Ex. 2. Petitioner has a pending appeal in the Eleventh Circuit, pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1291. The Supreme Court of the United States has jurisdiction under 28 U.S.C. § 1651(a).

STATEMENT OF THE CASE

Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina was born and raised in Miami, Florida within the confines and boundaries of the United States of America. Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina goes to church multiple times a week, likes to go out for dinner, likes to watch movies, likes to watch the news, likes going out for walks, shopping, surfing the internet and likes going to the gym. Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina is in a strict, consistent and successful treatment for psychiatric conditions, such as schizophrenia and bipolar disorder. Petitioner

Ian Anthony Medina went to University of Florida Levin College of Law for his 1L year and then graduated from Emory University School of Law on or about May 2019 in Atlanta, Georgia. Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina sought admission to the Respondent State Bar of Georgia and Respondent Florida Bar shortly thereafter. Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina was submitted to questioning regarding his mental health, psychiatric conditions, health status, medical treatment and diagnosis by Respondents Florida Board of Bar Examiners and Georgia Office of Bar Admissions. Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina was unlawfully denied character and fitness clearance and was denied admission to the state bars despite being competent and qualified to practice law as an attorney.

Moreover, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina is under a solid and bulletproof consistent psychiatric treatment that enables him to practice law without hindrance. The questioning regarding mental health and/or psychiatric conditions on law licensing applications and denials based on mental health violate the Americans With Disabilities Act, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Fifth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States, the Fourteenth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States, the Health Insurance Portability And Accountability Act and the Antitrust Acts, *supra*. As a proximate and actual result of Defendants unlawful questioning and denial, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina suffered immense and irreparable damages.

Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina brought suit against Respondent Georgia Office of Bar Admissions in the Supreme Court of Georgia to no avail and now turns to the federal judicial system for redress of grievances against Respondents Florida Board of Bar Examiners and Georgia Office of Bar Admissions. The Federal District Court in the Southern District of Florida dismissed the case via denial of application to proceed in forma pauperis. Then, the case was appealed to the United States Court of Appeals For The Eleventh Circuit. On or about December 10, 2021, Respondent Florida Bar sent Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina a letter via USPS that was intimidating and threatening. In the letter, Respondent Florida Bar informed Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina that he was under investigation for unauthorized practice of law and the matter was referred to the body in charge of unauthorized practice of law charges for more investigation and potential prosecution. On or about December 13, 2021, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina filed an Emergency Motion For Protective Order Restraining Appellees And Injunction to stop Respondent Florida Bar from investigating and prosecuting Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina pending appeal in the Eleventh Circuit. The United States Court of Appeals For The Eleventh Circuit denied the emergency motion for protective order and injunction. Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina now appeals

that decision in the supreme tribunal conferring jurisdiction vested in the Supreme Court of the United States.

ARGUMENT

I. ISSUANCE OF AN INJUNCTION IS NECESSARY TO MAINTAIN CLEARLY ESTABLISHED LEGAL RIGHTS AND TO PREVENT IRREPARABLE HARM

The Circuit Justices of this Court have authority to issue injunctions under the All Writs Act, 28 U.S.C. § 1651(a), when applicants' claims "are likely to prevail," the denial of injunctive relief "would lead to irreparable injury," and "granting relief would not harm the public interest." *Roman Cath. Diocese of Brooklyn v. Cuomo*, 141 S. Ct. 63, 65–66 (2020) (per curiam) (granting emergency injunctive relief to prevent likely constitutional violations from state law); see also *Ohio Citizens for Responsible Energy, Inc. v. Nuclear Regul. Comm'n.*, 479 U.S. 1312, 1312 (1986) (Scalia, J., in chambers) (injunctive relief under All Writs Act appropriate where the legal rights at issue are "indisputably clear," the circumstances are "critical and exigent," and 5 injunctive relief is "necessary or appropriate in aid of the Court's jurisdiction" (citations and alterations omitted)).

An application for an injunction may be granted without serving "as an expression of the Court's views on the merits," *Little Sisters of the Poor Home for the Aged v. Sebelius*, 571 U.S. 1171, 1171 (2014) (mem.), to prevent enforcement of a potentially unconstitutional statute. The Court has thus granted emergency injunctions pending appeal when there is a "fair prospect" of reversal and a likelihood of "irreparable harm . . . from the denial of equitable relief." *Lucas v. Townsend*, 486 U.S. 1301, 1304 (1988) (Kennedy, J., in chambers); see also, e.g., *Wheaton Coll. v. Burwell*, 134 S. Ct. 2806, 2807 (2014) (granting injunction enjoining enforcement of challenged provisions of the Affordable Care Act "pending final disposition of appellate review"); *Roman Cath. Diocese*, 141 S. Ct. at 66 (granting injunction enjoining enforcement of executive order limiting attendance at religious services).

Petitioner will suffer irreparable harm if his request for injunctive relief is denied. To establish irreparable harm, a party seeking preliminary injunctive relief must show that there is a continuing harm which cannot be adequately

redressed by final relief on the merits and for which money cannot provide adequate compensation. *Kamerling v. Massanari*, 295 F.3d 206, 214 (2d Cir. 2002) (quoting *N.Y. Pathological & X-Ray Labs., Inc. v. INS*, 523 F.2d 79, 81 (2d Cir. 1975)). Petitioner has established such irreparable harm from allowing Respondent Florida Bar to investigate and potentially prosecute Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina for unauthorized practice of law. Applicants identified at least five irreparable harms: losing their livelihoods; suffering adverse mental health; his inability to pursue his profession; reputational harm; perpetuating a toxic cycle of discrimination and oppression.

This irreparable harm is not remote nor speculative. It is actual and imminent as evidenced by the letters sent by Respondent Florida Bar threatening and intimidating Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina. These letters inform of an ongoing investigation and referral to the Chair of the Unauthorized Practice of Law committee for further investigation and potential prosecution. As such, allowing Respondent Florida Bar to continue the investigation and potential prosecution of Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina will cause irreversible and cureless damages. Allowing this would be a miscarriage of justice pending appeal because Petitioner already filed suit against Respondents. It is salt in the wound to discriminate and oppress someone by denying a law license because of a disability and then investigate and prosecute for unauthorized practice of law. This is antagonistic to principles of justice and equity. The very thought that Respondents could be so callous and hateful is repulsive. Thus, an injunction should be issued.

II. PETITIONER IS LIKELY TO SUCCEED ON THE MERITS

A. Due Process Claims Will Succeed on Merits

Petitioner has adequately shown the likelihood of a violation of a substantive due process claim because there will be a complete or partial inability to pursue his profession. A violation of one's fundamental right to pursue an occupation exists and gives rise to a due process claim where there is less than a complete inability to practice one's profession. *See Valmonte v. Bane*, 18 F. 3d 992, 1001 (2d Cir. 1994) (plaintiff stated substantive due process claim by alleging that she would be unable to get a job in the child-care field if her name was listed—as required by statute—on a register of

child abusers, even though employers retained the ability to hire plaintiff); see also *San Jacinto Say & Loan v. Kacal*, 928 F. 2d 697, 702 (5th Cir. 1991) (plaintiff has a liberty right to operate a legitimate business, free from arbitrary deprivation by state officials and finding a viable substantive due process claim where state officials' conduct sought to significantly alter plaintiffs liberty interests in her business). Here, the restraint and preclusion of allowing Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina from practicing law with a law license is violative of his due process rights in liberty and property interests. Case law is clear on these issues and Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina is likely to succeed on the merits of his due process claims.

B. Equal Protection Claims Will Succeed on Merits

Character and fitness inquiries regarding mental health are subject to—and cannot satisfy—strict scrutiny review as the right to pursue a lawful occupation is a fundamental right. As the Second Circuit has recognized, “the right to pursue a lawful calling has long been recognized as a fundamental right.” *Connecticut ex rel. Blumenthal v. Crotty*, 346 F.3d 84, 95 (2d Cir. 2003). Law school graduates, such as Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina, have a right to practice their profession. There is no rational and non-discriminatory basis for treating bar applicants with mental health issues differently than their counterparts. Respondents have failed to provide basis and justification for mental health queries in bar admissions nor have they provided basis and justification for why denials based on mental health and/or psychiatric conditions is lawful. Both are in fact unlawful, in violation of federal law.

As such, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina belongs to protected classes that merit constitutional scrutiny. Respondents learned of these qualities in Petitioner by reading his medical records. Then, with discriminatory intent, Respondents rendered disparate treatment of Petitioner when compared to similarly situated individuals not in Petitioner's protected classes. Thus, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina is likely to succeed on the merits of his equal protection claims.

C. Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 Claims Will Succeed on Merits

A core purpose of the ADA is the elimination of barriers caused by the use of stereotypic assumptions "that are not truly indicative of the individual ability of [persons with disabilities] to participate in, and contribute to, society." 42 U.S.C. §12101(a)(7). The ADA does not permit unnecessary inquiries into the existence of disabilities, and prohibits policies that impose greater requirements or burdens on individuals with disabilities than those imposed on others. While the ultimate goal of the Boards -- to ensure that persons admitted to the Florida Bar and Georgia Bar have the requisite moral character and fitness to practice law -- is certainly lawful, the means used by the Board to achieve that goal is not.

Title II contains a sweeping prohibition of practices by public entities that discriminate against persons with disabilities. A "public entity" is defined in title II to include "any department, agency ... or other instrumentality of a State ... or local government." 42 U.S.C. § 12131(1)(B). Defendants/Appellees fall within this definition as they are State governmental agencies responsible for licensing attorneys in the State of Florida and State of Georgia.

Under Title II and the Title II regulation, the term "disability" means:

- “(A) a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of such individual;
- (B) a record of such impairment; or
- (C) being regarded as having such an impairment.”

42 U.S.C. § 12102 (2); 28 C.F.R. § 35.104 (2021).

The Title II regulation states that "physical or mental impairment" includes "[a]ny mental or psychological disorder such as . . . emotional or mental illness" 28 C.F.R. § 35.104 (2021). Individuals not currently impaired but who have a history of mental illness or emotional disorder may fit into the second or third prongs of the statutory definition. Many persons diagnosed or treated for mental illness have at some time experienced substantial limitations in major life activities such as working, learning, caring for oneself, eating or sleeping. As such, Respondents are in violation of the Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 in their mental health queries and denials based on mental health and/or psychiatric conditions. Thus, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina is likely to succeed on the merits of his Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 claims.

III. THE BALANCING OF HARDSHIPS THAT WILL BE CAUSED BY INJUNCTION FAVORS THE GRANT OF INJUNCTION

The balance of hardships is determined by weighing the harm that will be suffered by the Petitioner if an injunction is not granted, against the harm that will be imposed upon the Respondent by the granting of an injunction. If the balance of hardships tips decidedly toward the Petitioner, it will ordinarily be enough that the Petitioner has raised questions going to the merits so serious, substantial, difficult, and doubtful as to make them a fair ground for litigation and thus for more deliberate investigation.

Here, Petitioner will suffer irreparable harm if an injunction is not issued. Investigation and prosecution for unauthorized practice of law by the very same entities that have discriminated and oppressed Petitioner is salt in the wound against all notions of fairness, equity and justice. The harm that Petitioner will suffer if an injunction is not issued will be irremediable and beyond repair because the just and right thing to do is allow Petitioner to practice law after he earned his Juris Doctor degree from Emory University School of Law with hard work, grit and perseverance.

Contrarily, Respondents will not suffer any harm if the injunction is issued. They can continue to oversee bar admissions in their respective states and will not be injured by the injunction. Respondents will not lose rights if the injunction is issued, they will not lose privileges if the injunction is issued, they will not lose benefits if the injunction is issued and they will not lose immunities if the injunction is issued. Thus, likelihood of any harm to Respondents by issuance of injunction is non-existent.


Moreover, the public interest favors issuing injunction because the public will benefit from Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina's practice of law because he is called to public service and will enrich the lives of many. Further, the public interest is in administration of fairness, justice and equality. This favors issuing injunction because Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina is the victim of discrimination and oppression at the hands of Respondents. Thus, this Honorable Court should grant injunction.

CONCLUSION

For the reasons set forth here, Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina respectfully asks this Honorable Court to issue injunction barring Respondents

from investigating and prosecuting Petitioner Ian Anthony Medina for unauthorized practice of law.

ORDER ON MOTION TO PROCEED *IN FORMA PAUPERIS*

THIS CAUSE is before the Court upon Plaintiff Ian Anthony Medina's ("Plaintiff") Motion for Leave to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis*, ECF No. [3] (the "Motion"), filed on October 29, 2021. The Court has reviewed the Motion, the record in this case, the applicable law, and is otherwise fully advised. For the reasons set forth below, Plaintiff's Motion is denied.

Fundamental to our conception and system of justice is that the courthouse doors will not be closed to persons based on their inability to pay a filing fee. However, "proceeding *in forma pauperis* is a privilege, not a right." *Camp v. Oliver*, 798 F.2d 434, 437 (11th Cir. 1986). The privilege of using the federal courts for free to right an individual civil wrong should be granted "sparingly." *Martinez v. Kristi Kleaners, Inc.*, 364 F.3d 1305, 1306 (11th Cir. 2004) (quoting *Flowers v. Turbine Support Div.*, 507 F.2d 1242, 1244 (5th Cir. 1975)). Congress has provided that a court "may authorize the commencement . . . or prosecution of any suit, action or proceeding . . . or appeal therein, without the prepayment of fees . . . therefor, by a person who submits an affidavit that includes a statement of all assets such [person] possesses that the person is unable to

pay such fees” 28 U.S.C. § 1915(a)(1); *see Martinez*, 364 F.3d at 1306 n.1 (interpreting statute to apply to all persons seeking to proceed *in forma pauperis* (“IFP”)).

Section 1915 requires a determination as to whether “the statements in the [applicant’s] affidavit satisfy the requirement of poverty.” *Watson v. Ault*, 525 F.2d 886, 891 (5th Cir. 1976). An applicant’s “affidavit will be held sufficient if it represents that the litigant, because of his poverty, is unable to pay for the court fees and costs, and to support and provide necessities for himself and his dependents.” *Martinez*, 364 F.3d at 1307; *see also Adkins v. E.I. DuPont de Nemours & Co.*, 335 U.S. 331, 339 (1948) (IFP status need not be granted where one can pay or give security for the costs “and still be able to provide himself and dependents with the necessities of life.”). The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) poverty guidelines are central to an assessment of an applicant’s poverty. *See Taylor v. Supreme Court of New Jersey*, 261 F. App’x 399, 401 (3d Cir. 2008) (using HHS Guidelines as basis for section 1915 determination); *Lewis v. Ctr. Mkt.*, 378 F. App’x 780, 784 (10th Cir. 2010) (affirming use of HHS guidelines). The section 1915 analysis requires “comparing the applicant’s assets and liabilities in order to determine whether he has satisfied the poverty requirement.” *Thomas v. Chattahoochee Judicial Circuit*, 574 F. App’x 916, 917 (11th Cir. 2014). Permission to proceed *in forma pauperis* is committed to the sound discretion of the court. *Camp*, 798 F.2d at 437 (“[P]ermission to proceed [IFP] is committed to the sound discretion of the court.”); *Thomas*, 574 F. App’x at 916 (“A district court has wide discretion in ruling on an application for leave to proceed IFP.”).

Plaintiff’s IFP application states that he is unemployed and has no income. *See* ECF No. [3] at 1. Plaintiff further states that he has \$227.31 in cash or in a checking or savings account, no assets, and no expenses. *See id.* at 2. The Court requires additional financial information to substantiate these claims. *See Kareem v. Home Source Rental*, 986 F. Supp. 2d 1345, 1346 (S.D.

Ga. 2013) (“It undeniably costs money to live Wary of such claims and cognizant of how easy one may consume a public resource with no financial skin in the game, the Court has demanded supplemental information.”).

Accordingly, Plaintiff shall provide the following information to the Court:

- (1) What he spends each month for basic living expenses such as food, clothing, shelter, and utilities, and the dollar value of any public or private assistance he may receive;
- (2) The source of funds to pay for those expenses;
- (3) Whether he owns any means of transportation and, if he does not, whether he has regular access to a means of transportation owned by someone else;
- (4) Whether he possesses a cellular telephone, TV set, and any home electronics equipment;
- (5) Whether he has any credit or debit cards;
- (6) Whether he is the account owner, or has signature power, as to any accounts with a bank or other financial institution;
- (7) Whether he anticipates any future income within the next year; and,
- (8) A list of any other cases showing an indigency-based filing fee reduction or waiver granted by any other court (include the full case name, case number, and the name of the court granting the reduction or waiver).

Plaintiff must declare these facts to be true under penalty of perjury. If he does not use a preprinted IFP form to respond, he must insert this above his signature: “I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the United States of America that the foregoing is true and correct. Executed on (date).” 28 U.S.C. § 1746(1).
