**MOTION TO EXPEDITE CONSIDERATION OF THE PETITION  
FOR A WRIT OF MANDAMUS**

---

In accordance with Supreme Court Rule 21, petitioner moves for expedited consideration of his petition for a writ of mandamus to the United States Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit and to the United States District Court for the Southern District of Georgia.


Since February 2021, Petitioner has made a good faith attempt to obtain, from the courts, an answer to his question regarding the Seventeenth Amendment: Does the Seventeenth Amendment deprive the State of Georgia of its equal suffrage in the Senate and does it require the State's consent under Article 5 of the Constitution? In addition, since the State of Georgia has not ratified the Seventeenth Amendment, is a popular election for United States Senator unconstitutional in the State of Georgia and does petitioner suffer in injury claim upon which relief may be granted if he is compelled, in violation of his oath to

support and defend the Constitution, to participate in an unconstitutional election and cast an illegal vote for United States Senator in violation of 52 U.S.C. 10307?

These questions could have been answered in a timely manner and could have been settled long before the upcoming November 8, 2022 was held. However, due to intolerable delays from the lower courts, petitioner is still waiting on a motion to dismiss that was filed on March 22, 2022 and the election is now only weeks away.

For these reasons, petitioner moves the court for an expedited consideration of his petition for a writ of mandamus in hopes that there is still time to resolve these questions before the election on November 8, 2022.
