Dear Clerk Harris:

The Petition for Writ of Certiorari to the Supreme Court of Texas was docketed in the above case on January 8, 2024, and responses are due to the Court on February 9, 2024. Our petition raises, among others, issues of constitutional due process limitations on the exercise of personal jurisdiction by a State court over foreign persons overseas with less than minimally required contacts with the forum State.

I write to advise the Court of the imminent filing of another Petition for Certiorari raising identical issues of due process limitations to personal jurisdiction over defendant civil litigants foreign to the forum State, albeit arising in the federal courts from the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. That case is captioned *Impossible Foods, Inc. v Impossible X LLC*, 80 F.4th 1079 (9th Cir. Sep. 12, 2023), *rev'g* Case No. 21-002419-BLF, 2021 WL 5331444 (N.D. Cal. Nov. 16, 2021).

Counsel for the petitioner Impossible X LLC advises me their Petition should be filed with the Court next week. With that in mind, I respectfully suggest that the Court might wish to hold over consideration of our Petition in *Nikolenko v. Nikolenko*, No. 23-476, until the Conference might consider it alongside the anticipated petition in *Impossible Foods Inc. v. Impossible X LLC*.
