## Step 9: Take the Oath of Allegiance to the United States.

You are not a U.S. citizen until you take the Oath of Allegiance at a naturalization ceremony. The oath is administered by USCIS at an administrative ceremony or by a judge in a judicial ceremony. A court has exclusive authority to conduct the ceremonies in certain USCIS districts.

You receive your Certificate of Naturalization after taking the Oath of Allegiance.

Chapter 2 - The Oath of Allegiance

#### A. Oath of Allegiance

"I hereby declare, on oath, that I absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state, or sovereignty, of whom or which I have heretofore been a subject or citizen; that I will support and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States of America against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I will bear arms on behalf of the United States when required by the law; that I will perform noncombatant service in the Armed Forces of the United States when required by the law; that I will perform work of national importance under civilian direction when required by the law; and that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; so help me God."

The Oath of Allegiance is administered in the English language, regardless of whether the applicant was eligible for an exception to the English language requirements. However, an applicant may bring an interpreter to interpret the oath during the ceremony.

#### Where does the decrease occur?

Table 2 and Table 3 show that the decline in LOTE speakers in 2013 is more prevalent among people who speak English very well, people born in the United States, and people under the age of 65. From 2010 to 2013, the share of the population over age five who spoke a language other than English and spoke English less than very well was generally stable; while there was a statistically significant decrease between 2011 and 2012, other year-to-year changes were not statistically significant. The pattern for the population over age five who speak English very well, however, underwent a shift. After statistically significant increases from 2010 to 2011 and 2011 to 2012, the share of the

population speaking English very well experienced a statistically significant decrease from 2012 to 2013. For nativity, estimates of the percent of people speaking a language other than English who were born outside the United States were steady over the four-year period as no year-to-year changes were statistically significant. In contrast, the share of the population age five and over that was native-born and spoke a language other than English underwent a shift. After statistically significant increases from 2010 to 2011 and 2011 to 2012, the percent of the population over five who were native-born LOTE speakers dropped from 9.36% to 9.19%. The age distribution of LOTE speakers also underwent a shift in 2013. There were declines from 2012 to 2013 in the number and percentage of people speaking a language other than English among the population aged 5 to 17 and 18 to 64, while the population over 65 saw both absolute and relative increases in speakers of other languages.



Table 4 and Table 5 show that the decrease in LOTE speakers in 2013 is concentrated among speakers of German, French, Italian, Hindi, other Indo-European languages, and Tagalog. While Italian has been losing speakers since 2011 and the change in the number of German speakers has not been statistically significant prior to 2013, both languages experienced large and statistically significant declines in 2013. French saw declines in numbers of speakers after gaining speakers in 2012. Hindi, other Indo-European languages, and Tagalog saw declines after increases in 2012. The estimate of the number of Spanish speakers was not statistically significantly different from the 2012 number, a deviation from statistically significant increases from 2010 to 2011 and from 2011 to 2012.

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## <u>Constitutional and Statutory Provisions</u> The Constitution of the United States of America Article I

<u>Section 4.</u> "The times, places and manner of holding elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing Senators."

#### Section 8.

<u>Clause 1.</u> "The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;"...

<u>Clause 4.</u> "To establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;"

<u>Clause 17</u>. "To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof."

#### Article II

<u>Section 3, Clause 4.</u> "[The President] shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed . . . ."

#### Article IV

Section 1. "Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records, and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the Congress may by general laws prescribe the manner in which such acts, records, and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof."

<u>Section 2, Clause 1.</u> The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

<u>Section 4, Clause 1.</u> "The United States shall guarantee to every state in this union a republican form of government . . . ."

#### Amendment V

"No person shall be . . . deprived of life, liberty or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation."

#### **Amendment XIV**

Section 1. "All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges

or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws."

#### Amendment XV

<u>Section 1.</u> The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

#### **Amendment XXIV**

Section 1. "The right of citizens of the United States to vote in any primary or other election for President or Vice President, for electors for President or Vice President, or for Senator or Representative in Congress, shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any state by reason of failure to pay a poll tax or other tax."

8 USC 1423: Requirements as to understanding the English language, history, principles and form of government of the United States

From Title 8-ALIENS AND NATIONALITY CHAPTER 12-IMMIGRATION AND NATIONALITY SUBCHAPTER III-NATIONALITY AND NATURAL-IZATION Part II-Nationality Through Naturalization

## §1423. Requirements as to understanding the English language, history, principles and form of government of the United States

- (a) No person except as otherwise provided in this subchapter shall hereafter be naturalized as a citizen of the United States upon his own application who cannot demonstrate-
  - (1) an understanding of the English language, including an ability to read, write, and speak words in ordinary usage in the English language: *Provided*, That the requirements of this paragraph relating to ability to read and write shall be met if the applicant can read or write simple words and phrases to the end that a reasonable test of his literacy shall be made and that no extraordinary or unreasonable condition shall be imposed upon the applicant; and
  - (2) a knowledge and understanding of the fundamentals of the history, and of the principles and form of government, of the United States.

- (b)(1) The requirements of subsection (a) shall not apply to any person who is unable because of physical or developmental disability or mental impairment to comply therewith.
- (2) The requirement of subsection (a)(1) shall not apply to any person who, on the date of the filing of the person's application for naturalization as provided in section 1445 of this title, either-
  - (A) is over fifty years of age and has been living in the United States for periods totaling at least twenty years subsequent to a lawful admission for permanent residence, or
  - (B) is over fifty-five years of age and has been living in the United States for periods totaling at least fifteen years subsequent to a lawful admission for permanent residence.
- (3) The Attorney General, pursuant to regulations, shall provide for special consideration, as determined by the Attorney General, concerning the requirement of subsection (a)(2) with respect to any person who, on the date of the filing of the person's application for naturalization as provided in section 1445 of this title, is over sixty-five years of age and has been living in the United States for periods totaling at least twenty years subsequent to a lawful admission for permanent residence.

#### **Title 52-VOTING AND ELECTIONS**

Subtitle I-Voting Rights

### §10303. Suspension of the use of tests or devices in determining eligibility to vote

- (a) Action by State or political subdivision for declaratory judgment of no denial or abridgement; three judge district court; appeal to Supreme Court; retention of jurisdiction by three judge court
  - (1) To assure that the right of citizens of the United States to vote is not denied or abridged on account of race or color, no citizen shall be denied the right to vote in any Federal, State, or local election because of his failure to comply with any test or device in any State with respect to which the determinations have been made under the first two sentences of subsection (b) or in any political subdivision of such State (as such subdivision existed on the date such determinations were made with respect to such State), though such determinations were not made with respect to such subdivision as a separate unit, or in any political with subdivision respect to which

determinations have been made as a separate unit, unless the United States District Court for the District of Columbia issues a declaratory judgment under this section. No citizen shall be denied the right to vote in any Federal, State, or local election because of his failure to comply with any test or device in any State with respect to which the determinations have been made under the third sentence of subsection (b) of this section or in any political subdivision of such State (as such subdivision existed on the date such determinations were made with respect to such State), though such determinations were not made with respect to such subdivision as a separate unit, or in any political subdivision with respect to which such determinations have been made as a separate unit, unless the United States District Court for the District of Columbia issues a declaratory judgment under this section. A declaratory judgment under this section shall issue only if such court determines that during the ten years preceding the filing of the action, and during the pendency of such action—

- (A) no such test or device has been used within such State or political subdivision for the purpose or with the effect of denying or abridging the right to vote on account of race or color or (in the case of a State or subdivision seeking a declaratory judgment under the second sentence of this subsection) in contravention of the guarantees of subsection (f)(2);
- (B) no final judgment of any court of the United States, other than the denial of declaratory judgment under this section, has

determined that denials or abridgements of the right to vote on account of race or color have occurred anywhere in the territory of such State or political subdivision or (in the case of a State or subdivision seeking a declaratory judgment under the second sentence of this subsection) that denials or abridgements of the right to vote in contravention of the guarantees of subsection (f)(2) have occurred anywhere in the territory of such State or subdivision and no consent decree, settlement, or agreement has been entered into resulting in any abandonment of a voting practice challenged on such grounds; and no declaratory judgment under this section shall be entered during the pendency of an action commenced before the filing of an action under this section and alleging such denials or abridgements of the right to vote;

- (C) no Federal examiners or observers under chapters 103 to 107 of this title have been assigned to such State or political subdivision;
- (D) such State or political subdivision and all governmental units within its territory have complied with section 10304 of this title, including compliance with the requirement that no change covered by section 10304 of this title has been enforced without preclearance under section 10304 of this title, and have repealed all changes covered by section 10304 of this title to which the Attorney General has successfully objected or as to which the United States District Court for the

District of Columbia has denied a declaratory judgment;

- (E) the Attorney General has not interposed any objection (that has not been overturned by a final judgment of a court) and no declaratory judgment has been denied under section 10304 of this title, with respect to any submission by or on behalf of the plaintiff or any governmental unit within its territory under section 10304 of this title, and no such submissions or declaratory judgment actions are pending; and
- (F) such State or political subdivision and all governmental units within its territory—
  - (i) have eliminated voting procedures and methods of election which inhibit or dilute equal access to the electoral process;
  - (ii) have engaged in constructive efforts to eliminate intimidation and harassment of persons exercising rights protected under chapters 103 to 107 of this title; and
  - (iii) have engaged in other constructive efforts, such as expanded opportunity for convenient registration and voting for every person of voting age and the appointment of minority persons as election officials throughout the jurisdiction and at all stages of the election and registration process.

- (f) Congressional findings of voting discrimination against language minorities; prohibition of Englishonly elections; other remedial measures
- The Congress finds that voting discrimination against citizens of language minorities is pervasive and national in scope. Such minority citizens are from environments in which the dominant language is other than English. In addition they have been denied equal educational opportunities by State and local governments, resulting in severe disabilities and continuing illiteracy in the English language. The Congress further finds that, where State and local officials conduct elections only in English, language minority citizens are excluded from participating in the electoral process. In many areas of the country, this exclusion is aggravated by acts of physical, economic, and political intimidation. The Congress declares that, in order to enforce the guarantees of the fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the United States Constitution, it is necessary to eliminate such discrimination by prohibiting English-only elections, and by prescribing other remedial devices.
- (2) No voting qualification or prerequisite to voting, or standard, practice, or procedure shall be imposed or applied by any State or political subdivision to deny or abridge the right of any citizen of the United States to vote because he is a member of a language minority group.

- (3) In addition to the meaning given the term under subsection (c), the term "test or device" shall also mean any practice or requirement by which any State or political subdivision provided any registration or voting notices, forms, instructions, assistance, or other materials or information relating to the electoral process, including ballots, only in the English language, where the Director of the Census determines that more than five per centum of the citizens of voting age residing in such State or political subdivision are members of a single language minority. With respect to subsection (b), the term "test or device", as defined in this subsection, shall be employed only in making the determinations under the third sentence of that subsection.
- (4) Whenever any State or political subdivision subject to the prohibitions of the second sentence of sub-section (a) provides any registration or voting notices, forms, instructions, assistance, or other materials or information relating to the electoral process, including ballots, it shall provide them in the language of the applicable language minority group as well as in the English language: *Provided*, That where the language of the applicable minority group is oral or unwritten or in the case of Alaskan Natives and American Indians, if the predominate language is historically un-written, the State or political subdivision is only required to furnish oral instructions, assistance, or other information relating to registration and voting.

#### Title 52-VOTING AND ELECTIONS

Subtitle I-Voting Rights

CHAPTER 105-SUPPLEMENTAL PROVISIONS

### 52 U.S.C. §10503. Bilingual election requirements

(a) Congressional findings and declaration of policy

The Congress finds that, through the use of various practices and procedures, citizens of language minorities have been effectively excluded from participation in the electoral process. Among other factors, the denial of the right to vote of such minority group citizens is ordinarily directly related to the unequal educational opportunities afforded them resulting in high illiteracy and low voting participation. The Congress declares that, in order to enforce the guarantees of the fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the United States Constitution, it is necessary to eliminate such discrimination by prohibiting these practices, and by prescribing other remedial devices.

- (b) Bilingual voting materials requirement
- (1) Generally

Before August 6, 2032, no covered State or political subdivision shall provide voting materials only in the English language.

- (2) Covered States and political subdivisions
  - (A) Generally

A State or political subdivision is a covered State or political subdivision for the purposes of this subsection if the Director of the

Census determines, based on the 2010 American Community Survey census data and subsequent American Community Survey data in 5-year increments, or comparable census data, that-

- (i)(I) more than 5 percent of the citizens of voting age of such State or political subdivision are members of a single language minority and are limited-English proficient;
- (II) more than 10,000 of the citizens of voting age of such political subdivision are members of a single language minority and are limited-English proficient; or
- (III) in the case of a political subdivision that contains all or any part of an Indian reservation, more than 5 percent of the American Indian or Alaska Native citizens of voting age within the Indian reservation are members of a single language minority and are limited-English proficient; and
- (ii) the illiteracy rate of the citizens in the language minority as a group is higher than the national illiteracy rate.

#### (B) Exception

The prohibitions of this subsection do not apply in any political subdivision that has less than 5 percent voting age limited-English proficient citizens of each language minority which comprises over 5 percent of the statewide limited-English proficient population of voting age citizens, unless the political subdivision is a covered political subdivision independently from its State.

#### (3) Definitions

As used in this section-

- (A) the term "voting materials" means registration or voting notices, forms, instructions, assistance, or other materials or information relating to the electoral process, including ballots;
- (B) the term "limited-English proficient" means unable to speak or understand English adequately enough to participate in the electoral process;
- (C) the term "Indian reservation" means any area that is an American Indian or Alaska Native area, as defined by the Census Bureau for the purposes of the 1990 decennial census;
- (D) the term "citizens" means citizens of the United States; and
- (E) the term "illiteracy" means the failure to complete the 5th primary grade.

#### (4) Special rule

The determinations of the Director of the Census under this subsection shall be effective upon publication in the Federal Register and shall not be subject to review in any court.

(c) Requirement of voting notices, forms, instructions, assistance, or other materials and ballots in minority language

Whenever any State or political subdivision subject to the prohibition of subsection (b) of this section provides any registration or voting notices, forms, instructions, assistance, or other materials or information relating to the electoral process, including ballots, it shall provide them in the language of the applicable minority group as well as in the English language: *Provided*, That where the language of the applicable minority group is oral or unwritten or in the case of Alaskan natives and American Indians, if the predominant language is historically unwritten, the State or political subdivision is only required to furnish oral instructions, assistance, or other information relating to registration and voting.

## (d) Action for declaratory judgment permitting English-only materials

Any State or political subdivision subject to the prohibition of subsection (b) of this section, which seeks to provide English-only registration or voting materials or information, including ballots, may file an action against the United States in the United States District Court for a declaratory judgment permitting such provision. The court shall grant the requested relief if it determines that the illiteracy rate of the applicable language minority group within the State or political subdivision is equal to or less than the national illiteracy rate.

#### (e) Definitions

For purposes of this section, the term "language minorities" or "language minority group" means persons who are American Indian, Asian

American, Alaskan Natives, or of Spanish heritage.
