PROCEDURAL BACKGROUND

On or about the 27th day of September 2023 the Illinois Supreme Court denied petitioner Cameron's unopposed petition for leave to appeal in the Illinois Supreme Court, without explanation. (A true and accurate copy of Illinois Supreme Court issued order of September 27th, 2023, is attached hereto and made part of this motion labeled Exhibit 1).

ARGUMENT

I, petitioner Cameron, contends that this court should grant this motion for extension of time to file Writ of Certiorari and allow an additional ninety (90) days in order for the Writ of Certiorari to be filed for the following reasons which will serve as a complete basis for allowing the Writ of Certiorari to be filed no later than March 27, 2024.

First, Petitioner Cameron is proceeding self-represented and without the assistance of competent legal representation. This is the very first time I will be attempting to set myself to perform such an arduous task of conducting essential legal research, formatting a Writ of Certiorari, and the drafting of the substance of Writ of Certiorari document in an attempt to meet the standards of this court, and I require additional time to engage in legal research for expressing the legal issues of exceptional importance concerning an entitlement to procedural due process and substantive due process, which I do not believe that I will be able to successfully complete within the ninety (90) day time period after the Illinois Supreme Court had denied my

unopposed Petition Requesting Leave to Appeal in the Illinois Supreme Court, without

explanation. Therefore, I will require to be afforded with additional time in the amount of ninety

(90) days, in order to perform all of the essential task associated with drafting a Writ of Certiorari

which will meet the mandatory requirements of this court.

Second, this motion requesting extension time to file my Writ of Certiorari is not being

submitted for any improper purpose such as to cause any unnecessary delay in these proceedings,

or to cause any unnecessary cost in this litigation, or to harass respondent Cameron and I,

petitioner Cameron, would be greatly prejudiced if an extension of time to file the Writ of

Certiorari were not to be granted.

Therefore, this court should grant this motion and allow an additional ninety (90) days or until

March 27, 2024, for the Writ of Certiorari to be filed and served upon respondent Cameron.

CONCLUSION

Based upon the aforementioned the fairest and just decision for this honorable court to make,

as a Guardian of the Law, would be that of granting this motion and allowing until March 27,

2024, in order for the Writ of Certiorari to be filed and served.

Granting this motion requesting extension of time will serve the ends of justice, and will not

prejudice any party.

WHEREFORE, the Self-Represented Petitioner, Artesia Cameron, respectfully request of

this Honorable Court to hand down a decision consistent with the relief sought in this motion

requesting extension of time to submit Writ of Certiorari.
