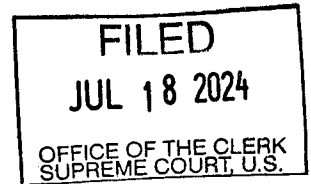

## INTRODUCTION

Petitioner, Mr. Gavin B. Davis, brings this Motion for Leave to Proceed In Forma Pauperis (“IFP”), on direct appeal from the Fifth Circuit judgment in case no.: 23-50812, a 28 U.S.C. § 1291 interlocutory appeal of a district court’s<sup>1</sup> denial<sup>2</sup> of Petitioner’s pretrial 18 U.S.C.

Davis*, USDC WD TX, SA-22-cr-219-FB-HJB (“22-219”) (Defendant was detained on May 10, 2022 and charged with: (a) three (3) counts of 18 U.S.C. §§ 2261 (A)(2)(B) (Cyberstalking) which indicate that the Defendant caused his three (3) fraternity brothers from Cornell University “substantial emotional distress; and, (b) one (1) count of 18 U.S.C. § 875 (c) (Interstate communication threat to injure; stemming from one brief phone call on Dec. 24, 2020, or twenty-nine months prior to being charged) (see Indictment, 22-219, Dkt. 3). The three (3) alleged victim witnesses and the Defendant are graduates of Cornell University; have been employed in Hotel Real Estate (asset brokerage, structured financing, development, private equity) and have maintained professional and personal relationships with each other for over twenty (20) years. Further, the three (3) alleged victim witnesses live thousands of miles away from the Defendant (California, Colorado and Utah). There is no mandatory minimum sentence for the criminal allegations (Counts 1-4); which is indicative that such crimes are not so serious as to deny pretrial liberty. These are not crimes were an accused is normally denied their Constitutional right to pretrial liberty.

§ 3164 Motion for Release <sup>3</sup> , declining jurisdiction on Feb. 7, 2024 <sup>4</sup> and FRAP 40 Rehearing on Feb. 21, 2024.<sup>5</sup>

Petitioner asks leave to file: the accompanying Petition for a Writ of Certiorari; an Application to Recall the Mandate (Rule 22); a Motion to Appoint Counsel (Rule 21); without prepayment of costs and to proceed in forma pauperis (Rule 39).

Petitioner has recently been granted leave to proceed in forma pauperis in directly related: (i) Fifth Circuit case no.: 23-50812<sup>6</sup>; as

<sup>6</sup> The Fifth Circuit has Noted that the Petitioner is "proceeding IFP in 23-50812" and that CJA counsel initially granted. (Rule 39.1)(see 23-50812 docket; Petitioner does not have docket access) In order for the Fifth Circuit to have GRANTED IFP status in 23-50812, Petitioner had to provide the Fifth Circuit Court with the requisite documentation as noted under SCOTUS Rule 39. However, as the Fifth Circuit Court erred in not reaching the merits of Petitioner's movement in 23-50812, declining jurisdiction: Petitioner's FRAP 9 Motion for Release and Motion to Appoint Counsel (see also, Fifth Circuit Court's CJA Plan (2023), Section 5) were not heard. Petitioner has submitted a contemporaneous

Global Tel\*Links Corporation* (“GTL”), USDC WD TX, 24-cv-284-FB-RFB, was GRANTED IFP status and the defendant was ordered to answer the 24-284 complaint and allegations of violating the

<sup>7</sup> On Sep. 5, 2023, Petitioner entered [a] *Faretta* waiver “as his sole mechanism of defense; without doing so, there may likely have been little contemporaneous evidence for the [Petitioner] to rely upon in relation to counsel Locke, now a non-advocate and bona fide opponent”.

<sup>8</sup> Subsequent to moving in propria persona on Sep. 5, 2023 in 22-219, Petitioner took the exact steps related to seeking his pretrial liberty that he timely requested that each of the prior four (4) defense attorneys take and was GRANTED conditional release; though, on terms and conditions that the Applicant views as punitive, oppressive and unlawful, prima facie. Such terms and conditions of the Dec. 6, 2023 Release Order collectively constitute, in no uncertain terms, a “virtual prison” (None of the proposed terms and conditions on form AO199B of the Dec. 6, 2023 Release Order: are (i) related to a (a) legitimate government interest; or, separately (b) justified as such; (ii) if potentially having legitimate purpose, are the least restrictive and most flexible respective term or condition as there are, in each instance, a multitude of less restrictive more flexible alternatives means and (iii) such ready alternatives have de minimus costs, respectively).

Federal Communications Act (FCA) and the Sherman Act.

In *Pothier v. Rodman*, 261 U.S. 307, 309; further, “we think an affidavit is sufficient which states that one cannot because of his poverty “pay or give security for the costs .. and still be able to provide” himself and dependents “with the necessities of life”. This, generally, relates to IFP status in federal civil litigation; but is relevant and should be sufficient on its own; or together with reliance upon the IFP status in the directly related underlying proceedings.

#### PETITIONER'S AFFIDAVIT

Petitioner, Mr. Gavin B. Davis, notes that he was provided an attorney due to indigence in the ongoing trial proceeding, USDC WD TX, 22-cr-219-FB-HJB; and, that there have been no positive changes to the Petitioner's financial


status since his continued detention<sup>9</sup> dating to May 10, 2022. Petitioner cannot, because of his poverty, pay or give security for the costs of this appeal and still be able to provide himself and dependents with the necessities of life.

<sup>9</sup> Petitioner is rated by U.S. Pretrial Services as a “Low” risk. The 22-219 allegations (Counts 1-4, Indictment, Dkt. 3) carry no minimum sentence and a five-year maximum – the manner in which the Petitioner’s Constitutional rights have been egregiously violated in taking him into custody should be extraordinarily shocking to any person interested in Constitutional Law. Also, Petitioner puts forth that: none of the four (4) 22-219 criminal allegations in the Indictment (Dkt. 3) fall under 18 U.S.C. § 3142 (e)(3) – and therefore, (A) the Petitioner cannot be legally detained; and, (B) separately, the current detention is, in fact, unlawful; and, (ii) none of the requisite six (6) conditions of 18 U.S.C. §§ 3142 (f)(1) or (2) are present; and, therefore, the Detention Order of May 20, 2022 must be timely Vacated (see e.g. *U.S. v. LaLonde*, 246 F. Supp. 2d 873 (S.D. Ohio 2003); “the magistrate’s detention order was vacated, as the statute did not permit the detention of the defendant who did not satisfy any of the conditions of a subsection of the statute regardless of his dangerousness to the community or to specific others” (LEXIS case overview). There is something incredibly wrong with this case and controversy – where – Petitioner’s Constitutional rights have been violated in multiple capacities (e.g. pretrial liberty; counsel as to that which is guaranteed under the Sixth Amendment; Due Process)

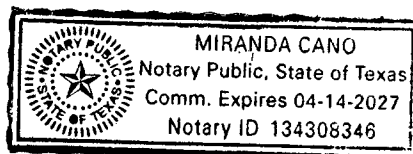

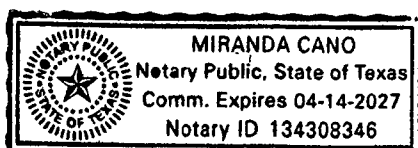
