MOTION FOR TIME EXTENSION

NOW COMES Aaron Christopher Taylor (herein "Taylor"), Petitioner in <u>pro se</u> capacity, pursuant to Rule 30.2, 30.4, who moves this Honorable Court for a (60) day time extension, and presents the following, to wit:

1.

Petitioner Taylor was arrested on February 25, 2022, by federal agents for several serious drug(s) and gun offenses. Retained counsel enrolled on the record immediately.

2.

Before an indictment could be returned by a grand jury, within six (6) weeks of Taylor's arrest, on April 6, 2022, Taylor tendered a plea of guilty to one count of 21 USC §§ 841(A); 841(b)(1)(B).

3.

Taylor received a prison term of (240) months and five years of supervised

release. An immediate direct appeal followed.

4.

On May 2, 2024, the Honorable Justice(s) of the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals denied Taylor's appeal. Motions For Time Extension to File a Petition For Rehearing was denied May 22, 2024.

5.

Taylor contends that the procedures outlined in Anders vs. California, 386 U.S. 738 (1967), coupled with outdated rules and polices of both the Appeals Court and the Federal Bureau of Prisons has caused him to suffer a significate miscarriage of justice - denial of free speech and or the right to litigate - upon his direct appeal, warranting the exercise of the authority of this Honorable Court.

6.

Taylor contends that he is a layman without the training, education, and or experience in litigation that is needed to stay within the (90) day time limit to submit his Writ of Certiorari, and therefore, moves for an additional (60) days time extension, that he may properly submit his Writ of Certiorari before this Honorable Court.

7.

Taylor is a federal prisoner currently housed at Federal Correctional Institution-Pollock, Pollock, Louisiana, a medium security facility and only has limited hours to perfect his Writ of Certiorari due to required work hours, rehabilitative/program classes, as well as the complexed issue(s) being presented for review.

Thus Taylor again moves for an additional (60) days to perfect his writ.

WHEREFORE, Petitioner prays that after due proceedings that it be ADJUDGED in his favor that he be GRANTED a (60) day time extension to file his Writ of Certiorari.

The Federal Public Defender appointed to represent Aaron Christopher Taylor has moved for leave to withdraw and has filed a brief in accordance with *Anders v. California*, 386 U.S. 738 (1967), and *United States v. Flores*, 632 F.3d 229 (5th Cir. 2011). Taylor has filed a response. The record is not sufficiently developed to allow us to make a fair evaluation of

Taylor's claims of ineffective assistance of counsel; we therefore decline to consider the claims without prejudice to collateral review. See United States v. Isgar, 739 F.3d 829, 841 (5th Cir. 2014). His motion for appointment of new counsel is DENIED as untimely. See United States v. Wagner, 158 F.3d 901, 902-03 (5th Cir. 1998).

We have reviewed counsel's brief and the relevant portions of the record reflected therein, as well as Taylor's response. We concur with counsel's assessment that the appeal presents no nonfrivolous issue for appellate review. Accordingly, the motion for leave to withdraw is GRANTED, counsel is excused from further responsibilities herein, and the appeal is DISMISSED. See 5TH CIR. R. 42.2.
