The Chief Justice said:

"With deep personal sorrow the Court learned of the death of its

Clerk, Charles Elmore Cropley, on June 17, 1952.

"Born in 1894, Mr. Cropley lived in Washington throughout his life. At the age of 13 he began his career with this Court as a Page boy. For two years, during 1911 and 1912, he left the Court to work in the Library of Congress and the Smithsonian Institution. However, in 1913, he returned as an Assistant Clerk. On June 6, 1927, he was appointed Clerk. He served in this capacity until his death.

"Charles Elmore Cropley loved and revered the Court. He brought to his office a degree of thoroughness and courteous dignity seldom found today. These qualities won for him the respect and friendship of the Court, its staff, and of lawyers and litigants throughout the Nation. On the occasion of his fortieth anniversary with the Court in 1948, the American Bar Association Journal praised his 'long and distinguished service, for which many lawyers have been unceasingly grateful from the time they first stepped timidly and hesitantly into the office of the Clerk of this great Court.'

"It was a part of Mr. Cropley's duties to furnish the Court with annual reports which reviewed the affairs of his office. Countless expressions in these reports reflect the full measure of his devotion, not just to his particular duties, but to the Court as an institution. He sometimes referred to his position as Clerk, not as his 'job,' but as his 'stewardship.' He spoke regularly of his 'inherent desire to preserve and perpetuate the traditions' of his office, of his respect and indebtedness to his associates for 'their loyal support in our common endeavor.' Even the various statistics, which he was called upon to recite to the Court, were phrased, not in the sterile language of the usual report, but in the language of one who cherishes a strong personal attachment to his duty. Thus, in commenting on the increased number of applications for membership to the Bar of the Court after 1945, Mr. Cropley wrote feelingly of the great number of lawyers who 'were done with the brutality of war,' who now sought the chance to serve 'in the Supreme legal forum where civilized process justly composes the conflicts of men.' On another occasion he wrote: 'The nearly

forty years since I first came to the Court gleam with innumerable facets of memory—those are my cherished and enduring gifts from the Court.'

"Perhaps, among those memories, were the proceedings of the Court on Monday, June 6, 1927. Chief Justice Taft observed: 'The Court takes great pride in the history of the maintenance of the traditions of the Clerk's office and of the length of service of those who administered it.' And, in announcing Mr. Cropley's appointment as Clerk, the Chief Justice said: 'He has great familiarity with the duties of the office and carries with him to its headship the traditions that have secured such distinguished and useful service by . . . his predecessors, with the probability of a life of long usefulness.'

"Surely this expression of confidence has been fulfilled. With sorrow we must now mark the end of Mr. Cropley's 'stewardship,' but we may always take pride that he served so well, that he, himself, was

always so proud to have opportunity to serve so well."

Mr. Acting Solicitor General Stern presented the Honorable James P. McGranery, Attorney General of the United States.

The Chief Justice said:

"Mr. Attorney General, the Court welcomes you to the performance of the important duties which devolve upon you as the chief law officer of the Government, and as an officer of this Court. Your commission will be recorded by the Clerk."

#### PER CURIAM.

In two appeals now pending, No. 8, Brown et al. v. Board of Education of Topeka et al., and No. 101, Briggs et al. v. Elliott et al., the appellants challenge, respectively, the constitutionality of a statute of Kansas, and a statute and the constitution of South Carolina, which provide for segregation in the schools of these states. Appellants allege that segregation is, per se, a violation of the Fourteenth Amendment. Argument in these cases has heretofore been set for the week of October 13, 1952.

In No. 191, Davis et al. v. County School Board of Prince Edward County et al., the appellants have filed a Statement of Jurisdiction raising the same issue in respect to a statute and the constitution of Virginia. Appellees in the Davis case have called attention to the similarity between it and the Briggs and Brown cases; by motion they have asked the Court to take necessary action to have all three cases argued together.

This Court takes judicial notice of a fourth case, which is pending in the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, *Bolling et al.* v. *Sharpe et al.*, No. 11,018 on that court's docket. In that case, the appellants challenge the appellees' refusal to admit

certain Negro appellants to a segregated white school, in the District of Columbia; they allege that appellees have taken such action pursuant to certain Acts of Congress; they allege that such action is a violation of the Fifth Amendment of the Constitution.

The Court is of the opinion that the nature of the issue posed in those appeals now before the Court involving the Fourteenth Amendment, and also the effect of any decision which it may render in those cases, is such that it would be well to consider, simultaneously, the constitutional issues posed in the case of *Bolling et al. v. Sharpe et al.* 

To the end that arguments may be heard together in all four of these cases, the Court will continue the *Brown* and *Briggs* cases on its docket. Probable jurisdiction is noted in *Davis et al.* v. *County School Board of Prince Edward County et al.* Arguments will be heard in these three cases at the first argument session in December.

The Court will entertain a petition for certiorari in the case of Bolling et al. v. Sharpe et al., 28 U. S. §§ 1254 (1), 2101 (e), which if presented and granted will afford opportunity for argument of the case immediately following the arguments in the three appeals now pending.

Mr. JUSTICE DOUGLAS dissents from postponing argument and decision in the three cases presently here for *Bolling et al.* v. *Sharpe et al.*, in the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit.

He is requested to examine and report on that point, if practicable, separately and prior to his report on the other issues, determining particularly whether effective relief could be granted petitioner without affecting the interest of the United States. The master shall give like consideration to any other allegation of indispensability made by any party defendant.

The master shall be allowed his actual expenses and a reasonable compensation for his services to be fixed hereafter by the Court. The allowances to him, the compensation paid to his stenographic and clerical assistants, and the cost of printing his report shall be charged against and be borne by the parties in such proportion as the Court hereafter may direct. If the appointment herein made of a master is not accepted, or if the place becomes vacant during the recess of the Court, the Chief Justice shall have authority to make a new designation which shall have the same effect as if originally made by the Court herein.

The Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Black are of the opinion that the present record establishes the indispensability of the United States and requires the dismissal of the complaint.

- "3. On the assumption that the answers to questions 2 (a) and (b) do not dispose of the issue, is it within the judicial power, in construing the Amendment, to abolish segregation in public schools?

"4. Assuming it is decided that segregation in public schools violates

the Fourteenth Amendment

"(a) would a decree necessarily follow providing that, within the limits set by normal geographic school districting, Negro children should forthwith be admitted to schools of their choice, or

- "(b) may this Court, in the exercise of its equity powers, permit an effective gradual adjustment to be brought about from existing segregated systems to a system not based on color distinctions?
- "5. On the assumption on which questions 4(a) and (b) are based, and assuming further that this Court will exercise its equity powers to the end described in question 4(b),
  - "(a) should this Court formulate detailed decrees in these cases;
    - "(b) if so what specific issues should the decrees reach;
  - "(c) should this Court appoint a special master to hear evidence with a view to recommending specific terms for such decrees;
  - "(d) should this Court remand to the courts of first instance with directions to frame decrees in these cases, and if so what general directions should the decrees of this Court include and what procedures should the courts of first instance follow in arriving at the specific terms of more detailed decrees?

No. —. Julius Rosenberg and Ethel Rosenberg, petitioners, v. United States. An application for stay of execution was filed herein on June 12, 1953. It was referred to Mr. Justice Jackson, the appropriate Circuit Justice. Mr. Justice Jackson referred it to the Court for consideration and action, with the recommendation "that it be set for oral hearing on Monday, June 15, 1953, at which time the parties have agreed to be ready for argument."

Upon consideration of the recommendation, the Court declined to hear oral argument on the application.

Mr. Justice Frankfurter and Mr. Justice Burton, agreeing with Mr. Justice Jackson's recommendation, believe that the application should be set for hearing on Monday, June 15, 1953.

Thereupon, the Court gave consideration to the application for the stay, and denies it, Mr. Justice Burton joining in such denial.

Mr. Justice Frankfurter and Mr. Justice Jackson, believing that the application for a stay should not be acted upon without a hearing before the full Court, do not agree that the stay should be denied.

Mr. Justice Black is of the opinion that the Court should grant a rehearing and a stay pending final disposition of the case. But since a sufficient number do not vote for a rehearing, he is willing to join those who wish to hear argument on the question of a stay.

Mr. Justice Douglas would grant a stay and hear the case on the merits, as he thinks the petition for certiorari and the petition for rehearing present substantial questions. But since the Court has decided not to take the case, there would be no end served by hearing oral argument on the motion for a stay. For the motion presents no new substantial question not presented by the petition for certiorari and by the petition for rehearing.

Present: Mr. Chief Justice Vinson, Mr. Justice Black, Mr. Justice Reed, Mr. Justice Frankfurter, Mr. Justice Douglas, Mr. Justice Jackson, Mr. Justice Burton, Mr. Justice Clark, and Mr. Justice Minton.

No. 1, Misc. Julius Rosenberg and Ethel Rosenberg, petitioners, v. Wilford L. Denno, Warden of Sing Sing Prison. The motion for leave to file petition for an original writ of habeas corpus is denied. Mr. Justice Black dissents.

Mr. Justice Frankfurter:

"The disposition of an application to this Court for habeas corpus is so rarely to be made by this Court directly that Congress has given the Court authority to transfer such an application to an appropriate district court. 28 U. S. C., § 2241. I do not favor such a disposition of this application because the substance of the allegations now made has already been considered by the District Court for the Southern District of New York and on review by the Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit. Neither can I join the Court in denying the application without more. I would set the application down for hearing before the full Court tomorrow forenoon. Oral argument frequently has a force beyond what the written word conveys."

## SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES

The Court met in Special Term pursuant to a call by the Chief Justice.

The Chief Justice said:

"The Court is now convened in Special Term to consider an application by the Attorney General (1) to review the stay of execution of Julius Rosenberg and Ethel Rosenberg, granted by Mr. Justice Douglas on June 17, 1953, or (2) for reconsideration and reaffirmance of this Court's order of June 15, 1953, in No. 1, Misc., Julius Rosenberg and Ethel Rosenberg, petitioners, v. Wilford L. Denno, Warden of Sing Sing Prison, June 1953 Special Term, denying a stay.

"The Special Term convenes with the approval of all the Associate

Justices except Mr. Justice Black, who objects."

No. — Julius Rosenberg and Ethel Rosenberg v. United States of America. On motion to vacate a stay. Order of Mr. Justice Douglas granting stay of execution of death sentences vacated. Opinion per curiam announced by Mr. Chief Justice Vinson. Mr. Justice Frankfurter is of opinion that the questions raised for the first time vesterday before the full Court by the application of the Attorney General are complicated and novel. I believe that, in order to enable the Court to adjudicate these issues upon adequate deliberation, this application should be disposed of only after opportunity has been afforded to counsel for both sides to make an adequate study and presentation. In due course, I will set forth more specifically the grounds for this position. Opinion by Mr. Justice Jackson in which Mr. Chief Justice Vinson, Mr. Justice Reed, Mr. Justice Burton, Mr. Justice Clark, and Mr. Justice Minton join. Opinion by Mr. Justice Clark in which Mr. Chief Justice Vinson, Mr. Justice Reed, Mr. Justice Jackson, Mr. Justice Burton, and Mr. Justice Minton join. Dissenting opinion by Mr. Justice Black. Dissenting opinion by Mr. Justice Frankfurter. Dissenting opinion by Mr. Justice Douglas.

Motion of counsel for petitioners for a further stay submitted by Mr. Emanuel H. Bloch.

Motion for reconsideration of the question of the Court's power to vacate Mr. Justice Douglas' stay order and to hear oral argument submitted by Mr. Fyke Farmer.

Per Curiam: Motion of the petitioners for a further stay of the execution, as set forth in the written motion, is denied. Opinion per curiam announced by Mr. Chief Justice Vinson. Dissenting: Mr. Justice Black.

Mr. Justice Frankfurter:

"On the assumption that the sentences against the Rosenbergs are to be carried out at 11 o'clock tonight, their counsel ask this Court to stay their execution until opportunity has been afforded to them to invoke the constitutional prerogative of clemency. The action of this Court, and the division of opinion in vacating the stay granted by Mr. Justice Douglas are, of course, a factor in the situation, which arose within the last hour. It is not for this Court even remotely to enter into the domain of clemency reserved by the Constitution exclusively to the President. But the Court must properly take into account the possible consequences of a stay or of a denial of a stay of execution of death sentences upon making an appeal for executive clemency. Were it established that counsel are correct in their assumption that the sentences of death are to be carried out at 11 p. m. tonight, I believe that it would be right and proper for this Court formally to grant a stay with a proper time limit to give appropriate opportunity for the process of executive elemency to operate. I justifiably assume, however, that the time for the execution has not been fixed as of 11 o'clock tonight. Of course I respectfully assume that appropriate consideration will be given to a clemency application by the authority constitutionally charged with the clemency function."

Per Curiam: The motion for reconsideration of the question of the Court's power to vacate Mr. Justice Douglas' stay order and hear oral argument is denied. Opinion per curiam announced by Mr. Chief Justice Vinson. Dissenting: Mr. Justice Black. Mr. Justice Frankfurter desires that it be noted that he too would deny the motion to reconsider the power of this Court to review Mr. Justice Douglas' order to stay the execution, but not because he thinks the matter is free from doubt. See his dissenting opinion in Ex parte Peru, 318 U. S. 578, 590, in connection with Lambert v. Barrett, 157 U. S. 697 and Carper v. Fitzgerald, 121 U. S. 87.
