# SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES

Present: Mr. Chief Justice Warren, Mr. Justice Black, Mr. Justice Reed, Mr. Justice Frankfurter, Mr. Justice Douglas, Mr. Justice Burton, Mr. Justice Clark, Mr. Justice Minton, and Mr. Justice Harlan.

Mr. Attorney General Brownell presented the Honorable J. Lee Rankin, of Nebraska, Solicitor General of the United States.

The Chief Justice said :

"Mr. Solicitor General, the Court welcomes you to the performance of the important duty with which you are specially charged, the duty of representing the Government at the Bar of this Court on all cases in which it asserts an interest. Your commission will be recorded by the Clerk.

I should also like to take this occasion to commend the work of your predecessor in office, Judge Sobeloff, and to wish him every success and happiness on the Bench."

The commission of the Solicitor General is in the following words, viz:

"Dwight D. EISENHOWER

"PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

"To all who shall see these Presents, Greeting:

"KNOW YE: That reposing special trust and confidence in the Wisdom, Uprightness and Learning of J. Lee Rankin, of Nebraska, I do appoint him Solicitor General of the United States and do authorize and empower him to execute and fulfill the duties of that Office according to the Constitution and Laws of the said United States, and to Have and to Hold the said Office, with all the powers, privileges, and emoluments to the same of right appertaining, unto him, the said J. Lee Rankin, until the end of the next session of the Senate of the United States and no longer; subject to the provisions of law.

"In testimony whereof, I have caused these Letters to be made patent and the seal of the Department of Justice to be hereunto affixed.

"Done at the City of Washington this fourteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifty-six and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and eighty-first.

"DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER.

Petition for writ of certiorari to the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit granted. No. 316 is assigned for argument immediately following No. 149. Oral argument will be limited to 45 minutes a side.

"1. Whether a conviction of a conspiracy to procure from the Fraud Bureau of the Internal Revenue Department a decision not to prosecute a tax fraud, where the object of the conspiracy had been accomplished by January, 1949, and prosecution was barred under the statute of limitations by January, 1952, may be sustained, on the theory that the conspiracy must have included a continuing agreement to conceal—the indictment having been found October 25, 1954, and the proof being that one or more of the conspirators in March, 1952, attempted to cover their tracks from investigators.

"2. Whether independent acts of alleged conspirators, after the accomplishment of the object of the conspiracy and done without the knowledge or the participation of the petitioner Grunewald, may suffice to support a charge against him that the original conspiracy included a continuing purpose to conceal so that the conspiracy might be deemed to extend down to the last act of concealment.

"3. Whether an alleged continuing conspiracy to conceal could be found as to the petitioner Grunewald, when he was concerned only with the original object of the conspiracy and was acquitted by the Trial Court on three counts of attempting to influence witnesses, which the Court charged the jury could be acts of continuing concealment.

"4. Whether a purpose to continue to conceal the accomplishment of the primary conspiracy may be inferred from the fact that the conspirators would be presumed to know that their activities would always be open to investigation—whether a subordinate conspiracy to conceal may be implied from the original crime.

"5. Whether the Trial Court committed error in permitting the jury to find a continuing conspiracy to conceal from the fact that, more than three years after the object of the conspiracy had been accomplished, the petitioner Grunewald, when his secretary was subpoenaed before a grand jury, told her she need not answer various questions and could say she forgot.

"6. Whether the Trial Court committed error in permitting the defendant Halperin, the only witness for the defense, to be cross-examined, for the purpose of impeaching his credibility, on the fact that he had been, prior to the trial, subpoenaed before a grand jury and had there claimed his constitutional privilege against self-incrimination on a long line of questions. The constitutional privilege thus infringed is that part of the Fifth Amendment which reads "\* \* \* nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself \* \* \*?'"

### No. 184:

"1. When a defendant testifies in his own defense at his trial, and his answers to questions show that, although averring his innocence, he was justified in invoking the Fifth Amendment with regard to like questions before a Grand Jury—as in this case all agree—is not that defendant denied due process when the Government on cross-examination brings out before the trial jury, the fact that he refused to answer the questions before the Grand Jury, upon such constitutional grounds?

"2. When a defendant has been subpoenaed to testify before a Grand Jury in an investigation, of which he is a primary target, has claimed his Constitutional privilege, advised the Grand Jury that he was doing so as an innocent man ensnared in suspicious circumstances and because he could not cross-examine or be represented by counsel, may the trial court charge the jury that they, may consider his refusal to testify before the Grand Jury on the score of his credibility, although his trial testimony was entirely consistent with his position before the Grand Jury?

"3. Under the circumstances surrounding a defendant's appearance before a Grand Jury as set forth in the last preceding paragraph, does not the Court's instruction as aforesaid illegally impeach and impede the defendant's statutory right to be a witness on his own behalf?

"4. Does the rationale of *Raffel* v. *United States*, 271 U. S. 244, apply to prior invocation of the Fifth Amendment before a Grand Jury as distinguished from such action at a prior trial?

"5. Does not the doctrine and rationale of *Slochower* v. *Board of Higher Education*, decided by this Court April 9, 1956, compel the conclusion that a defendant under the circumstances aforesaid, is denied due process of law when he is examined by the Government and compelled to admit that he refused to answer questions before the Grand Jury, and the Trial Court advises the jury they may consider that refusal on the subject of his credibility?

"6. Is not a defendant, particularly one who asserted that he was invoking the Fifth Amendment as an innocent man being plotted against and beset by suspicious circumstances entitled to have the jury charged, 'An innocent man may honestly claim his answers may tend to incriminate him'?

"8. Does not the opinion of the Court of Appeals that the statute of limitations against conspiracy was not tolled, in that certain overt acts of concealment when committed were chargeable to the original conspiracy disregard and deny effect to this Court's views on proof of subsidiary concealment conspiracies, as set forth in *Krulewitch* v. United States, 336 U. S. 440, and Lutwak v. United States, 344 U. S. 604?

"9. Does not the conclusion of the Court of Appeals herein that a single conspiracy rather than a multiplicity of conspiracies are disclosed by the record, run counter to this Court's decision in *Kotteakos* v. United States, 328 U. S. 750?"

No. 186:

"1. Whether the three year Statute of Limitations, applicable to the charge of conspiracy, barred conviction of the petitioner Bolich inasmuch as the objective of the alleged conspiracy had been achieved by January, 1949—more than five years before the date of the indictment which was filed on October 25, 1954.

"2. Whether multiple conspiracies were established by the evidence, rather than a single general conspiracy, to the substantial prejudice of the rights of the petitioner Bolich.

"6. Whether the trial Court committed prejudicial error in permitting the government to elicit from the defendant Halperin upon his cross-examination that he had invoked the Fifth Amendment at a Grand Jury hearing and the trial Court charged the jury that they might consider Halperin's claim of constitutional privilege as adversely affecting his credibility."

A total of two hours will be allowed for argument on these questions.

(b) No. 184:

"7. Does it constitute due process to subpoena a person to testify before a Grand Jury in an investigation of which he is a primary target, and thereby permit an examination before trial of a *de facto* defendant?

"11. Does a lawyer who advises a witness to plead the Fifth Amendment where the witness is justified in doing so become guilty of corruptly endeavoring to influence the witness merely because the interposition of the Constitutional privilege might also serve to protect the person giving the advice?"

A total of one hour will be allowed for argument on these questions.

"In testimony whereof, I have caused these Letters to be made patent and the seal of the Department of Justice to be hereunto affixed.

"Done at the City of Washington this fifteenth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifty-six and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and eighty-first.

I, § 8, cl. 14, power was thought to have a fixed and rigid content or rather that this power, as modified by the Necessary and Proper Clause, was considered a broad grant susceptible of expansion under changing circumstances.

"3. The relevance, for purposes of court-martial jurisdiction over civilians overseas in time of peace, of any distinctions between civilians employed by the armed forces and civilian dependents.

"4. The relevance, for purposes of court-martial jurisdiction over civilian dependents overseas in time of peace, of any distinctions between major crimes and petty offenses."

Mr. Justice Reed, Mr. Justice Burton, and Mr. Justice Clark would deny the petition for rehearing. They believe that the problems presented in the above questions, with the exception of No. 4, the answer to which in their opinion is obvious, have been fully presented in the briefs and argument already had. Mr. Justice Brennan took no part in the consideration or decision of this application and order.

"We, who are his associates, regret his retirement but only in the sense that we shall be deprived of his daily companionship and wise counsel.

"For him, we rejoice that this retirement comes while he is in full vigor of mind and body, and capable of enjoying the many good things of life, which his long and devoted public service has compelled him to forego.

"Our personal regard for him and our appreciation of his great service to the Court are most adequately expressed in our letter to him which, with his brotherly reply, will be spread upon the Minutes of the Court."

Sec. 1915, Congress provided for proceedings *in forma pauperis* on appeal unless "the trial court certifies in writing that it (the appeal) is not taken in good faith." Such certification is not final in the sense that the convicted defendant is barred from showing that it was unwarranted and that an appeal should be allowed. Of course, certification by the judge presiding at the trial carries great weight

but, necessarily, it cannot be conclusive. Upon a proper showing a Court of Appeals has a duty to displace a District Court's certification. Moreover, a Court of Appeals must, under Johnson v. Zerbst, 304 U. S. 458, afford one who challenges that certification the aid of counsel unless he insists on being his own. Finally, either the defendant or his assigned counsel must be enabled to show that the grounds for seeking an appeal from the judgment of conviction are not frivolous and do not justify the finding that the appeal is not sought in good faith. This does not require that in every such case the United States must furnish the defendant with a stenographic transcript of the trial. It is essential, however, that he be assured some appropriate means—such as the district judge's notes or an agreed statement by trial counsel-of making manifest the basis of his claim that the District Court committed error in certifying that the desired appeal was not pursued in good faith. See Miller v. United States, 317 U.S. 192, 198.

Since here the Court of Appeals did not assign counsel to assist petitioner in prosecuting his application for leave to appeal *in forma pauperis* and since it does not appear that the Court of Appeals assured petitioner adequate means of presenting it with a fair basis for determining whether the District Court's certification was warranted, the judgment below must be vacated and the case remanded to the Court of Appeals for proceedings not inconsistent with this opinion.

Northern Coal Co.*, 293 U. S. 191. Mr<sub>i</sub> Justice Douglas dissents.

The Chief Justice said:

Per Curiam: Petitioners in both the above cases have applied to individual Justices for bail under Rule 46 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure. The relevant legal circumstances concerning bail are identical in both cases. Both were convicted of income tax evasion involving § 145 (b) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1939. Both were sentenced to imprisonment for five years on each of three counts, the sentences to run concurrently. Both contend that they should have been sentenced under § 3616 (a) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1939, which makes it a misdemeanor (punishable by a maximum of one year's imprisonment) to file a false return with intent to evade tax, the offense for which each was convicted. The question petitioners raise was discussed but not decided in Berra v. United States, 351 U. S. 131. This question is presented in Achilli v. United States, No. 430, which the Court has set for hearing during the week of April 29. Pending final determination of this question, we think petitioners are entitled to bail, the Government having presented no adequate reason why bail should not be granted. Accordingly, petitioners are admitted to bail, pending the disposition of the Achilli case, by executing a good and sufficient bail bond in the sum of \$25,000, the same to be approved by a district judge of the court in which petitioners were convicted. Following approval, the bond will be posted with the clerk of the district court.

The Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit has certified to this Court the following question: "Does the phrase 'any substance' as employed in 26 C. F. R., Section 175.121, 1952 Cumulative Pocket Supplement, include tax paid distilled spirits?"

It appears that the question certified by the Court of Appeals was decided by another panel of that court less than a year and a half before the present certification, on reviewing the dismissal of the indictment in this very case. United States v. Goldberg, 225 F. 2d 180. Because of the volume of business, all but two Circuits have more than three Circuit Judges. This undoubtedly raises problems when one panel has doubts about a previous decision by another panel of the same court. Whatever procedure a Court of Appeals follows to resolve these problems-and desirable judicial administration commends consistency at least in the more or less contemporaneous decisions of different panels of a Court of Appeals-doubt about the respect to be accorded to a previous decision of a different panel should not be the occasion for invoking so exceptional a jurisdiction of this Court as that on certification. It is primarily the task of a Court of Appeals to reconcile its internal difficulties. See In re Burwell, 350 U. S. 521; Western Pacific R. Corp. v. Western Pacific R. Co., 345 U. S. 247. It is also the task of a Court of Appeals to decide all properly presented cases coming before it, except in the rare instances, as for example the pendency of another case before this Court raising the same issue, when certification may be advisable in the proper administration and expedition of judicial business.

The certificate must be dismissed.

Allen-Bradley Co., 352 U.S. 306, and National Lead Co. v. Commissioner, 352 U. S. 313, in which we had granted certiorari the same day, viz., June 11, 1956, 351 U.S. 981. If there is to be uniformity in the application of the principles announced in those two companion cases, the judgment below in the instant case cannot stand. Accordingly we now grant the petition for rehearing, vacate the order denying certiorari, grant the petition for certiorari, and reverse the judgment of the Court of Claims on the authority of United States v. Allen-Bradley Co., supra, and National Lead Co. v. Commissioner, supra.

We have consistently ruled that the interest in finality of litigation must yield where the interests of justice would make unfair the strict application of our rules. This policy finds expression in the manner in which we have exercised our power over our own judgments, both in civil and criminal cases. Clark v. Manufacturers Trust Co., 337 U. S. 953; Goldbaum v. United States, 347 U. S. 1007; Banks v. United States, 347 U. S. 1007; McFee v. United States, 347 U. S. 1007; Remmer v. United States, 348 U. S. 904; Florida ex rel. Hawkins v. Reversed.

Co.*, 352 U. S. 500; *Webb* v. *Illinois Central R. Co.*, 352 U. S. 512; *Ferguson* v. *Moore-McCormack Lines*, 352 U. S. 521. The cause is remanded for further proceedings not inconsistent with this decision and without prejudice to the power of the Court of Appeals to reinstate its judgment if the dispute is submitted to the Adjustment Board by either party within a reasonable time.

On petition for writ of certiorari to the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. *Per Curiam:* The motion for leave to proceed *in forma pauperis* and the petition for writ of certiorari are granted. The writ of certiorari is limited to the question whether, in the circumstances of this case, the state court proceedings to settle the trial transcript, upon which petitioner's automatic appeal from his conviction was necessarily heard by the Supreme Court of the State of California, in which trial court proceedings petitioner allegedly was not represented in person or by counsel designated by the state court in his behalf, resulted in denying petitioner due process of law, within the meaning of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

2. Appearances upon the writ of certiorari will be confined to counsel for the respective parties, and their argument will be limited to the single question indicated above. 3. The brief for the petitioner will be served and filed on or before April 24, 1957. The brief for the respondent will be served and filed on or before May 10, 1957. The petitioner may file a reply brief within one week after the oral argument. The Chief Justice took no part in the consideration or decision of this application.

On writ of certiorari to the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. Judgment of the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit is reversed and the cause is remanded to the United States District Court for the Northern District of California for further action consistent with this opinion. Opinion by Mr. Justice Burton. Mr. Justice Whittaker took no part in the consideration or decision of this case.

No. 295. United States of America, appellant, v. George I. Witkovich, also known as Juri Isador Witkovich. Appeal from the United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois. Judgment of the United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois affirmed and the case is remanded to the District Court. Opinion by Mr. Justice Frankfurter. Dissenting opinion by Mr. Justice Clark with whom Mr. Justice Burton joins. Mr. Justice Whittaker took no part in the consideration or decision of this case.

The Chief Justice announced the following order of the Court:

No. 769. Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, City of Philadelphia, et al., appellants, v. The Board of Directors of City Trusts of the City of Philadelphia. Appeal from the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, Eastern District. Per Curiam: The motion to dismiss the appeal for want of jurisdiction is granted. 28 U.S.C. § 1257 (2). Treating the papers whereon the appeal was taken as a petition for writ of certiorari, 28 U. S. C. § 2103, the petition is granted. 28 U. S. C. § 1257 (3). Stephen Girard, by a will probated in 1831, left a fund in trust for the erection, maintenance, and operation of a "college." The will provided that the college was to admit "as many poor white male orphans, between the ages of six and ten years, as the said income shall be adequate to maintain." The will named as trustee the City of Philadelphia. The provisions of the will were carried out by the State and city and the college was opened in 1848. Since 1869, by virtue of an act of the Pennsylvania Legislature, the trust has been administered and the college operated by the "Board of Directors of City Trusts of the City of Philadelphia." Pa. Laws 1869, No. 1276; Purdon's Pa. Stat. Ann., 1957, Tit. 53, \$ 1365.

In February 1954, the petitioners Foust and Felder applied for admission to the college. They met all qualifications except that they were Negroes. For this reason the Board refused to admit them. They petitioned the Orphan's Court of Philadelphia County for an order directing the Board to admit them, alleging that their exclusion because of race violated the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution. The State of Pennsylvania and the City of Philadelphia joined in the suit also contending the Board's action violated the Fourteenth Amendment. The Orphan's Court rejected the constitutional contention and refused to order the applicant's admission. 4 D. & C. 2d 671 (Orph. Ct. Philadelphia). This was affirmed by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. 386 Pa. 548.

The Board which operates Girard College is an agency of the State of Pennsylvania. Therefore, even though the Board was acting as a trustee, its refusal to admit Foust and Felder to the college because they were Negroes was discrimination by the State. Such discrimination is forbidden by the Fourteenth Amendment. Brown v. Board 2

of Education, 347 U. S. 483. Accordingly, the judgment of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania is reversed and the cause is remanded for further proceedings not inconsistent with this opinion.

The Chief Justice said:

"The other orders of the Court appear upon the list certified by the Chief Justice and filed with the Clerk and will not be announced orally."

No. 719. Henry Hinton Favors, petitioner, v. Ira M. Coiner, Acting Warden, West Virginia State Penitentiary. On writ of certiorari to the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia. Per Curiam: The Attorney General of West Virginia has agreed that this case should be remanded to the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia for a hearing to determine the truth of the allegations made in the petition for writ of habeas corpus. If true, the allegations of that petition and the attached affidavit state a deprivation of constitutional rights under Mooney v. Holohan, 294 U.S. 103. Other contentions of deprivation of constitutional rights are pressed in the brief submitted to this Court on behalf of the petitioner. We express no opinion as to the validity of these contentions, but assume that they will be open to the petitioner on the hearing in the court below. The judgment of the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia is vacated, and the cause is remanded for further proceedings not inconsistent with this opinion.

No. 800. A. P. Van Meter, Robberson Steel Company, Capitol Steel & Iron Company, et al., appellants, v. Jack D. Abraham et al. Appeal from the Supreme Court of Oklahoma. *Per Curiam:* The motion to dismiss is granted and the appeal is dismissed.

No. 801. Aero Design & Engineering Co. et al., appellants, v. Oklahoma Employment Security Commission et al. Appeal from the United States District Court for the Western District of Oklahoma. *Per Curiam:* The judgment is affirmed.

No. 814. Sunray Mid-Continent Oil Company, petitioner, v. Federal Power Commission. On petition for writ of certiorari to the United States Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit. *Per Curiam:* The petition for writ of certiorari is granted. The power of the Court of Appeals in reviewing the order of the Federal Power Commission was exhausted when it held that the Commission had authority under §7 (c) and (e) of the Natural Gas Act to issue certificates of public convenience and necessity of limited duration. *Securities and Exchange Commission* v. *Chenery Corp.*, 318 U. S. 80. The judgment is therefore reversed and the case is remanded to the United States Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit for remand to the Commission with directions to consider the applications on their merits. The Commission, now agreeing with the Court of Appeals as to its authority, agrees to this disposition of the case. Mr. Justice Clark took no part in the consideration or decision of this case.

S. 1), it is ordered that the joint motion be, and it is hereby, granted and the former decree, as amended, is vacated and a new decree is entered to read as follows:

"IT IS ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED, that:

I. The State of Colorado, or anyone recognized by her as duly entitled thereto, shall have the right to divert from the Laramie river and its tributaries, for use in the State of Colorado, 49,375 acre-feet of water in each calendar year, which diversion and use shall be subject to the limitations and restrictions hereinafter set forth. The State of Wyoming, or anyone recognized by her as duly entitled thereto, shall have the right to divert and use all water flowing and remaining in the Laramie river and its tributaries after such diversion and use in Colorado.

II. The State of Colorado, its officers, attorneys, agents and employees be, and they are severally enjoined

(a) from diverting or permitting the diversion of more than 19,875 acre-feet of water in any calendar year from the Laramie river and its tributaries for use in Colorado at any or all points outside of the basin of said river, which amount may be diverted by the present owners of transmountain water rights or by their successors in ownership, through any ditches, canals, tunnels or structures capable of carrying the same, as the owners of said water rights and of such structures may from time to time agree among themselves, or as may be determined by a court of competent jurisdition:

(b) from diverting or permitting the diversion of more than 29,500 acre-feet of water in any calendar year from the Laramie river and its tributaries for use in Colorado within the drainage basin of said river, of which amount not more than 1,800 acre-feet shall be diverted in any calendar year after July 31; provided, that if in any calendar year any part or all of said 19,875 acre-feet of water which may be diverted for use outside of the drainage basin of said river, the amount not so diverted may be

added to the amount which may be diverted hereunder for use in Colorado within the drainage basin of said river. Such water diverted for use in Colorado within the drainage basin of said river shall be diverted only through the headgates of ditches serving, and shall only be used to irrigate, those lands within the Laramie river basin in Colorado which are marked and designed by cross-hatching on Exhibit "A" attached hereto and hereby made a part hereof, by the present owners of said lands and the water rights serving said lands or by their successors in ownership, and none of said waters shall be used for the irrigation of any lands not included within the boundaries of the lands so indicated on Exhibit "A".

III. Except as modified or restricted hereby, the relative rights to the use of Colorado's share of the Laramie river shall continue to be governed by the rules of appropriation and use as determined by the laws of Colorado, and shall be administered by its water officials.

IV. This decree shall not prejudice or affect the right of the State of Colorado or the State of Wyoming, or of anyone recognized by either state as duly entitled thereo, to continue to exercise the right to divert and use water from Sand Creek, sometimes spoken of as a tributary of the Laramie river, in virtue of an existing and lawful appropriation of the waters of such creek.

V. The Clerk of this Court shall transmit to the chief magistrates of the States of Wyoming and Colorado copies of this decree duly authenticated under the seal of this Court."

Mr. Justice Burton and Mr. Justice Clark dissent. They would note jurisdiction of this appeal and afford the Attorney General an opportunity to present the Government's side of this important internal security problem. United States v. Witkovich, supra, in which they dissented, limited § 242 (d) (3) of the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, 66 Stat. 211, as amended, 8 U. S. C. (Supp. IV) § 1252 (d) (3), "to authorizing all questions reasonably calculated to keep the Attorney General advised regarding the continued availability for departure of aliens \* \* \*." It passed on clause (3) and no other. This appeal involves other clauses of § 242 (d), namely, clauses (1) and (4), neither of which was passed on in Witkovich. The Court, by summary affirmance of this appeal, without argument, enlarges its holding in *Witkovich* and strikes down two more clauses of § 242 (d). These two clauses are vital to the effectuation of the purpose of the Congress in controlling subversives whose ordered deportation has been forestalled by technical difficulties. For a more detailed discussion see their dissent in *Witkovich*.

The Chief Justice said :

"The orders of the Court appear upon the list certified by the Chief Justice and filed with the Clerk and will not be announced orally." No. 844. Boyd R. Ringhiser, petitioner, v. Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company. On petition for writ of certiorari to the United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit. *Per Curriam*: The petition for certiorari is granted, and the judgment is reversed and the cause is remanded. The trial judge set aside the jury verdict for the petitioner because, *inter alia*, it was held that the respondent "had no duty to anticipate that a car was being used for such a purpose." There was evidence, however, as the trial court found, that to respondent's knowledge employees used gondola cars for the purpose. In that circumstance there were probative facts from which the jury could find that respondent was or should have been aware of conditions which created a likelihood that the petitioner would suffer just such an injury as he did. *Rogers* v. *Missouri Pacific R. Co.*, 352 U. S. 500; cf. *Wilkerson* v. *McCarthy*, 336 U. S. 53.

Mr. Justice Frankfurter is of the opinion that the writ of certiorari should not be granted. Since the writ has been granted, he would dismiss it as improvidently granted for the reasons set forth in his opinion in *Rogers* v. *Missouri Pacific R. Co.*, 352 U. S. 500, 524.

Mr. JUSTICE CLARK, dissenting.

As MR. JUSTICE DOUGLAS said in Wilkerson v. McCarthy, 336 U.S. 53, 68 (1949), "The liability which [the FELA] imposed was the liability for negligence." Believing that the Congress was looking to the courts to see that the railroads were held to strict accountability under the Federal Employers' Liability Act<sup>1</sup> for any negligence whatever resulting in injury to an employee, the Court has taken cases that in ordinary course it would have denied as involving only particular facts rather than questions "of importance to the public," Layne & Bowler Corp. v. Western Well Works, Inc., 261 U. S. 387, 393 (1923). As in the seamen's Jones Act<sup>2</sup> cases, the Court feels a duty under this Federal Act to examine each case to make certain that its mandate is honored.<sup>3</sup> There has been no breach in this policy since its establishment soon after the amendment of the Act in 1939. In my opinion, however, the judgment today goes beyond the most generous interpretation that may be given to the Act. The petitioner suffered the grevious injury which resulted in the loss of a leg while using, as a toilet, one of the railroad's cars standing on a switch track. While petitioner was "answering his call of nature" in the car, it moved slightly from a contact with two other cars that were being switched. This contact caused some steel plates in the car to shift, crushing petitioner's right leg.

The Court does not find a failure on the part of the railroad to provide a safe place for the petitioner to work insofar as toilet facilities are concerned. The railroad thus is not found negligent in this respect. But the Court seizes upon a statement in the trial judge's memorandum that "There is evidence that employees sometimes used gondola cars in lieu of toilets. The Court must assume that this was known to the defendant." The trial judge found, however, that the railroad could not anticipate that this particular gondola car would be used for that purpose because it was loaded with freightsteel plates—and was standing on a track that was being used for normal switching operations. The judge points out that petitioner himself thought that the car was empty when he climbed into it. If the car had not been loaded the petitioner would not have suffered the injury which resulted. For these reasons the trial judge found that the railroad could not anticipate that its employee would so use a loaded car or that the resultant injury would occur. In addition, the petitioner had admitted that he "certainly [did] did not feel that the yard crew was careless in any manner . . . This was a very easy impact and the two standing cars did not move over a foot at the most."

In the light of such a record it appears to me that negligence could not be imputed to the railroad. Of course, if the majority is saying that the railroad must inspect every loaded car awaiting switching, lest an employee be using it as a toilet, then I could easily understand the action here. But this it does not say, for it would be not only an unrealistic but an untenable burden to place on the railroad. The court cites two cases, neither of which appears to me to be apposite. Tn Rogers v. Missouri Pacific R. Co., 352 U.S. 500, 502 (1957), "petitioner was supplied with a crude hand torch and was instructed to burn off the weeds and vegetation along [the railroad's track]." The mishap occurred while he was performing these services. There was a "likelihood that petitioner . . . would suffer just such an injury as he did." Id., at 504. In Wilkerson v. McCarthy, supra, the railroad had constructed a pit in its yards for the repair of car wheels. It was 40 feet long, 11 feet deep, and over 4 feet wide and was under a series of 3 or more railroad tracks. A permanent board about 22 inches wide was constructed across the pit and was used by the employees of the railroad to walk across it. While there was a chain placed around a portion of the pit it was not sufficient to stop employees from using the board for crossing purposes. An employee slipped on the board which was greasy and oily and was injured by a fall to the bottom of the pit. There was thus a very hazardous practice which, a jury might find, the railroad took inadequate precautions to prohibit. The railroad was held responsible. The practice here may be unsanitary, but it is

not foreseeably hazardous. This accident resulted from a combination of freak circumstances rather than from actionable negligence.

While I was not on the Court when *Wilkerson* was decided, I fully agree with its holding and likewise adhere to my joining the Court in the *Rogers* case. The factual situations in those cases are far removed from the facts here. In my opinion the decision today extends the doctrine of these cases far beyond any theory of liability for negligence that the Congress intended under the Federal Employers' Liability Act.

MR. JUSTICE HARLAN, whom MR. JUSTICE WHITTAKER joins, dissenting.

The facts of this case, as summarized by District Judge Cecil, are these:

"On October 7, 1950, Boyd R. Ringhiser, the plaintiff herein, arose in the afternoon, made preparation to report for duty at 4:45 p. m., had a bowel movement, made a mental calculation, and thereby set in motion a chain of events which created a result both unusual and tragic.

"The sequence of these events is as follows: The plaintiff's bowel movement was unsatisfactory; 'This won't do,' said he to himself (statement made by plaintiff at trial, but ordered stricken); he took a dose of salts and washed it down with sweet cider; he got in his car and drove to Parson's Yard, the switching yard of the defendant, and had a bowel movement at the roundhouse. He then got on his engine and maneuvered it to track twelve, where it was coupled on to a train scheduled for Walbridge Yard at Toledo. While sitting in his engine waiting for his air brake test, he had an urgent call of nature and 'had to go quick.' He dismounted from his locomotive cab to go to a toilet a short distance west. A long train of empties passed between him and the object of his immediate attention. He could not wait for this train to pass and went to No. 8 switch track and climbed into a low-sided gondola car to answer his call of nature. While thus engaged, a vard crew switched two cars into No. 8 switch track. These cars came in contact with the car ahead of plaintiff's car and it likewise came in contact with plaintiff's car. The gondola car in which plaintiff had taken his position was loaded with steel plates and when the cars made contact the plates shifted, caught plaintiff's right leg and crushed it so that a few days later, it had to be amputated."

On these facts I do not think the accident was a reasonably foreseeable consequence of any act or omission of the railroad. I therefore dissent.

Lincoln Mills, No. 211, October Term, 1956. Mr. Justice Frankfurter dissents on the grounds of his dissenting opinion in Textile Workers v. Lincoln Mills, No. 211, October Term, 1956. Mr. Justice Black took no part in the consideration or decision of this case.

Judgment of the Court of Appeals reversed and case remanded to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia with instructions to dismiss the indictment. Opinion by Mr. Chief Justice Warren. Concurring opinion by Mr. Justice Frankfurter. Dissenting opinion by Mr. Justice Clark. Mr. Justice Burton and Mr. Justice Whittaker took no part in the consideration or decision of this case.

No. 175. Paul M. Sweezy, appellant, v. State of New Hampshire by Louis C. Wyman, Attorney General. Appeal from the Supreme Court of New Hampshire. The appeal is dismissed for want of jurisdiction. Treating the papers whereon the appeal was taken as a petition for writ of certiorari, certiorari is granted. On writ of certiorari to the Supreme Court of New Hampshire, judgment reversed and case remanded to the Supreme Court of New Hampshire for proceedings not inconsistent with the judgment of this Court. Mr. Chief Justice Warren announced the judgment of the Court and delivered an opinion in which Mr. Justice Black, Mr. Justice Douglas, and Mr. Justice Brennan join. Separate opinion by Mr. Justice Frankfurter, with whom Mr. Justice Harlan joins, concurring in the result. Dissenting opinion by Mr. Justice Clark with whom Mr. Justice Burton joins. Mr. Justice Whittaker took no part in the consideration or decision of this case.

No. 426. Jesse Blackburn, petitioner, v. State of Alabama. On writ of certiorari to the Court of Appeals of Alabama. Judgment vacated and case remanded to the Court of Appeals in order that it may pass upon petitioner's claim to the protection of the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution. They are further ordered to make payments totaling \$50,000 to Simon H. Rifkind, Esquire, Special Master, on account of the fee to be awarded by this Court as compensation for his services as Special

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Master. Such payments are to be made in the proportions set forth above.

Appeal from the United States District Court for the Eastern District of South Carolina. *Per Curiam:* In view of the repeal of South Carolina Act No. 741 of 1956 by Act No. 324 of 1957 after the decision below, 148 F. Supp. 563, the cause has become moot. Accordingly, the judgment of the District Court is vacated and the case is remanded to it, with leave to the appellants to amend their pleadings either to safeguard any rights that may have accrued to them by virtue of the operation of the repealed Act or to set forth a cause of action based on the operation of the new Act. Rule 15 of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure.

On petition for writ of certiorari to the Supreme Court of Ohio. *Per Curiam*: The petition for writ of certiorari is granted, the judgment of the Supreme Court of Ohio is reversed, and the cause is remanded. *Rogers* v. *Missouri Pacific R. Co.*, 352 U. S. 500 (1957).

Mr. Justice Frankfurter, dissenting.

In Rogers v. Missouri Pacific R. Co., 352 U. S. 500, 524, I gave my reasons for deeming it an abuse of the Court's discretionary certiorari jurisdiction to make cases arising under the Federal Employers' Liability Act a class exception to the Court's principle against granting certiorari when all that is involved is the evaluation of evidence. The circumstances of the present case vividly emphasize the objections to such an exception.

All that is to be determined in this case is whether there were sufficient facts to warrant a jury in finding that the lighting in the situation in which petitioner worked, assumed to be inadequate, caused in whole or in part the injury to petitioner. The trial judge in the Court of Common Pleas thought not. On review, the Court of Appeals of Lucas County reversed: two judges thought there were enough facts to justify a jury's finding of causation while the dissenting judge agreed with the trial court. On review of this reversal, the Supreme Court of Ohio, with one of its seven judges not sitting, unanimously reversed the Court of Appeals and restored the judgment of the trial 166 Ohio St. 129, 140 N. E. 2d 319. Thus, this issue of the court. sufficiency of evidence for a jury's finding of relevant causation was passed on by the three courts in the hierarchy of Ohio's judiciary. Of the ten judges, eight found the evidence insufficient for a jury to guess at and two thought they should be allowed to guess-for determination of causation is inescapably guessing, informed guessing if you will, but guessing.

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Justice Burton took no part

Congress saw fit to give the state courts jurisdiction of the rights it created by the Federal Employers' Liability Act. Presumably, it had confidence in the state courts for enforcement of these rights. It emphasized this confidence by a special Act, passed more than forty years ago, which withdrew from this Court what theretofore had been appealability as of right of judgments of state courts in Federal Employers' Liability Act cases. It left adjudications brought in the state courts with the state courts, except in instances applicable generally to the jurisdiction on writ of certiorari, to be exercised, that is, "only where there are special and important reasons therefor." Rule 19 of the Revised Rules of this Court.

It cannot be too often repeated. This Court has said again and again that a difference of opinion in weighing evidence is not included among "special and important reasons" for granting certiorari. One would suppose that an examination of the evidence by three courts and ten judges of Ohio would be proof that the facts in the case have been conscientiously canvassed. A different case would be presented were this Court to find that the Ohio Supreme Court applied wrong legal standards to the particular facts before it or evinced hostility to the federal statute. Either one of these grounds would present a fair basis on which to seek review here of the decision of the Ohio Supreme Court. But that is not the basis on which review was sought and on which it is granted. In agreeing to take the case, the Court merely accedes to the natural desire of an unsuccessful plaintiff to have one more court guess whether there were enough facts on which the jury should be allowed to do its guessing. And so the nine members of the highest tribunal in the land, preoccupied with more than enough cases involving the gravest issues of national importance, are asked to take on the task of making an independent study of the record below (for I must assume that those who review the merits have examined the 294 pages of the record), the four opinions below, and the briefs of parties, after three courts and ten judges of Ohio have conscientiously dealt with questions that are not specialized questions of federal law and indeed constitute probably the most recurring staple business of the courts throughout the country. I must respectfully decline to assume this task. This Court from time to time is compelled to hold that a federal court has abused some discretionary judicial power. Abuse of judicial discretion is a technical phrase to express a misconception of the judicial function as exercised in a particular situation. There is no appeal from such abuse of judicial discretion by this Court. When there is such a misuse of power, as I deem it to be in making an exception, in effect if not formally, of cases under the Federal Employers' Liability Act that turn merely on evaluation of evidence, only the individual conscience remains. Since this case underscores the reasons for declining to associate myself in what I regard as a misuse of the power properly vested in a minority of this Court in granting certiorari, I have no choice but to conclude that the writ of certiorari in this case has been improvidently granted and, having been granted, should be dismissed.

Mr. Justice Burton, dissenting.

For the reasons stated by the Supreme Court of Ohio, 166 Ohio St. 129, 140 N. E. 2d 319, I believe that petitioner's injuries were not caused, "in whole or in part," by the possible inadequacy of the lighting.

Mr. Justice Harlan, with whom Mr. Justice Whittaker joins, dissents for the reasons given in his opinion in *Rogers* v. *Missouri Pacific R. Co.*, 352 U. S. 500, 559 (1957).

United States, No. 261, October Term, 1956, decided June 17, 1957. Mr. Justice Burton would note probable jurisdiction and set the case for argument. Mr. Justice Clark dissents from this disposition of the case for the reasons stated in his dissenting opinions in *Sweezy* v. New Hampshire by Wyman, and Watkins v. United States, supra.

No. 686, Misc. Charles Leo Farley, petitioner, v. United States of America. On petition for writ of certiorari to the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit. *Per Curiam*: The petition for writ of certiorari is granted, as is the motion for leave to proceed *in forma pauperis*.

Petitioner was convicted of bank robbery in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of New York and sentenced to 20 years' imprisonment. Under 28 U. S. C. § 1915 he applied to the 2

District Court for leave to appeal *in forma pauperis*. Petitioner, who was assisted by court-appointed counsel in preparing his application, contended that the evidence was insufficient to justify his conviction and that the trial court had committed reversible error by permitting the United States Attorney to ask him irrelevant and prejudicial questions about another criminal offense. Petitioner requested that the District Court make available a transcript of the trial record so he could substantiate his claimed errors. In reply the United States Attorney filed an affidavit asserting that the evidence was sufficient to sustain petitioner's conviction. However, the affidavit did not directly controvert petitioner's claim that the prosecuting attorney had been allowed to inject irrelevant and prejudicial matter into the trial. Counsel for petitioner then filed an affidavit in answer supporting petitioner's allegation of errors.

The District Court refused the request for a transcript of the trial record and denied the application for leave to appeal *in forma pauperis* on the ground that the appeal was "not taken in good faith" because it was "frivolous and without merit" and "[t]he evidence amply supported the verdict." Petitioner then asked the Court of Appeals for permission to appeal *in forma pauperis* but that court denied his request indicating that his claimed errors were without substance. 242 F. 2d 338. And see 238 F. 2d 575.

As things now stand conflicting affidavits have been introduced concerning petitioner's contention of errors at the trial. If the allegations made by petitioner and his counsel are correct then it seems quite clear to us that his appeal cannot be characterized as frivolous. Before his allegation of errors can be accurately evaluated, however, to ascertain if they do have any merit he should be furnished with a transcript of the trial record-unless counsel can agree on a statement of the relevant facts or some other means are devised to make the minutes of the trial available to petitioner-so that he has an opportunity to substantiate his allegations and point out their significance and so that they can be appraised on a dependable record. Cf. Johnson v. United States, 352 U. S. 565. In our judgment petitioner has not yet been afforded an adequate opportunity to show the Court of Appeals that his claimed errors are not frivolous so as to enable that court to review properly the District Court's certification that the appeal was in bad faith. Accordingly the judgment below must be vacated and the case remanded to the Court of Appeals for further proceedings not inconsistent with this opinion.

Mr. Justice Clark and Mr. Justice Harlan dissent.
