PER CURIAM:

Albert Charles Burgess, Jr., appeals the district court's order adopting the recommendation of the magistrate judge and dismissing as barred by the statute of limitations his civil action for legal malpractice and tortious interference with contract and additionally dismissing his legal malpractice claim for failure to state a claim. We have reviewed the record and find no reversible error. Accordingly, we affirm for the reasons stated by the district court. *Burgess v. Elliott*, No. 3:16-cv-03325-RBH (D.S.C. Apr. 27, 2017).
