Addendum: Errata Page

The Department recently discovered non-material data errors in the *Explanation of the Decision to Terminate the Migrant Protection Protocols*, dated October 29, 2021. This addendum accordingly revises that memorandum in two respects. The first change shows the rates of encounters along the southwest border decreasing following the full implementation of MPP, but to a lesser degree than was previously presumed. The second change, also reflected in the updated appendix, indicates a lower percentage and absolute numbers of releases from detention than previously reported, but the key point remains the same: the Department has never detained all noncitizens described in 8 U.S.C. § 1225.

Errata to the Explanatory Memorandum

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But from June 2019, when DHS announced that MPP would be fully implemented along the entire SWB, through September 2019, border encounters decreased rapidly, falling $\frac{64}{50}$ percent in just three months.

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From Fiscal Years 2013 to 2019, nearly three-quarters <u>43 percent</u> of single adult and family unit members who were encountered at the SWB were either never placed in or released from detention during the pendency of their proceedings— more than 1.1 million <u>almost</u> <u>750,000</u> (44 <u>21</u> percent) were never booked into ICE detention, and <u>nearly 900,000 more</u> than 770,000 (33 <u>22</u> percent) were booked in for a period of time but released prior to the conclusion of their removal proceedings. Even during the period that MPP was in effect from late January 2019 to January 20, 2021, more than two-thirds <u>59 percent</u> of single adults and individuals in family units encountered along the SWB and processed through non-MPP Title 8 authorities—more than <u>650,000</u> <u>520,000</u> individuals <u>encounters</u>—were never detained or <u>were</u> released from ICE custody during the duration of their proceedings; a full 42 <u>38</u> percent (more than <u>415,000</u> <u>330,000</u> individuals) were never booked into ICE detention at all.
