JOHN ADAMS, PRESIDENT of the
UNITED STATES of AMERICA.

To _____ Marshal for the District of _____ or his
Deputy, GREETING:

WHEREAS by an Act of Congress, intituled, “An
Act concerning Aliens,” passed on the twenty-fifth day
of June, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-
eight, it is enacted, *That it shall be lawful for the
President of the United States to order all such Aliens
as he shall judge dangerous to the peace and safety of
the United States, or shall have reasonable grounds to
suspect are concerned in any treasonable or secret
machinations against the government thereof, to
depart out of the territory of the United States, within
such time as shall be expressed in such order:* AND
WHEREAS it appears to me, That

and an alien to the United States, is a person within
the meaning and description of the aforesaid Act, and
that his longer residence within the United States will
endanger their peace and safety: NOW THEREFORE,
I do hereby require you to give notice to the said
_____ that he depart, and he is hereby ORDERED
to depart out of the territory of the United States,
within _____ days after a copy of this order shall be
delivered to him, or left at his usual abode: BUT

WHEREAS it is provided by the aforesaid Act, *That if any alien, ordered in pursuance thereof, to depart from the territory of the United States, shall prove, to the satisfaction of the President, by evidence to be taken before such person or persons, as the President shall direct, and who for that purpose are authorized to administer oaths, that no injury or danger to the United States will accrue from suffering such alien to reside therein, the President may grant a licence to such alien to remain within the United States, for such time as he shall judge proper, and at such place as he may designate:* NOW THEREFORE I do hereby also require you to give notice to the said _____ that he may appear, if he see fit, at any time within _____ days prior to the expiration of the period above limited for his departure from the United States, before

_____ and exhibit to the said _____ such proofs as he the afore-mentioned alien shall think proper, with the view to obtain a licence, as aforesaid, to remain within the territory of the United States

AND FURTHERMORE, I do require you to execute this ORDER, by delivering a copy thereof, duly ce[torn]nder your hand, to the said _____ or by leaving a copy, so certified, [torn]sual abode; and of this Order and your proceedings thereon, certified under your hand, you are to make return to the Secretary of State forthwi[torn] the service of this Order on the said _____

Arrest and deportation of an alien contract laborer.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF IMMIGRATION,
Washington, D. C., September 17, 1894.

SIR: The bureau is in receipt of your letter of September 15, 1894, No. 2156, in which you transmit papers in the case of Henry W. Elliott, aged 29, who arrived as a first-cabin passenger, per steamship *Berlin*, August 20, 1894. From a careful examination of the affidavits transmitted, the Department is of the opinion that the said Elliott previous to his embarkation from London for the United States entered into a contract with Mr. Augustin Daly to perform labor and services as property man in the theater belonging to said Daly, known as "Daly's Theater," in the city of New York. It moreover appears from the evidence submitted that said Elliott upon arrival went to his destination, and has in fact worked pursuant to said contract made prior to his landing, and has been paid for said work at the rate of \$30 per week by said Daly. It also appears that the matter has been carefully investigated by James McKim, immigrant inspector, under the direction of the Commissioner of Immigration at the port of New York.

The case has been presented to the honorable the Secretary of the Treasury, and he being satisfied that

the immigrant has been allowed to land contrary to the provisions of the Alien Contract-Labor Law, has caused his warrant to be issued for the arrest and deportation to the country whence he came of the said Henry W. Elliott, as provided by law. Said warrant is addressed to James McKim, immigrant inspector, and inclosed herewith. After arrest and prior to deportation the deposition of the said Henry W. Elliott should be taken, and together with all the papers in the case, and such other evidence as you may be able to gather, submitted to the U. S. district attorney for the district in which the alleged violation has occurred, and suit instituted against the contractor to recover the penalties prescribed by law.

WARRANT.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,
Washington, D. C., September 17, 1894.

Whereas, from proofs submitted to me, I have become satisfied that Henry W. Elliott, an alien immigrant who landed in the United States at the port of New York on the 20th day of August, 1894, came into this country from London, England, contrary to the prohibition of the acts of Congress

approved February 26, 1885, February 23, 1887, October 19, 1888, and March 3, 1891, commonly known as the Alien Contract-Labor Laws; and whereas, the period of one year after landing has not elapsed:

I, John G. Carlisle, Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the above cited acts of Congress, do hereby command you to take into custody the said Henry W. Elliott, alien immigrant, and return him to the country whence he came at the expense of the vessel importing him.

For so doing, this shall be your sufficient warrant.

WARRANT—ARREST OF ALIEN

WHEREAS, from evidence submitted to me, it
appears that

MAGDALENE GLINDEMANN, aged 16, native
of Germany,

alien who landed at the port of New York per S.S.
“Kaiserin Auguste Victoria” on the 11th day of Aug.
1906, has been found in the United States in violation
of the Act of Congress approved March 3, 1903, to wit:

That said alien entered the United States without
inspection as prescribed by the above mentioned Act,
and is reported to be at River Rouge, Michigan;

I, V. H. METCALF, Secretary of Commerce and
Labor, by virtue of the power and authority vested in
me by the laws of the United States, do hereby

command you to take into custody the said alien and convey her before an officer designated by you to enable her to show cause why she should not be deported in conformity with law. After conclusion of such hearing, the alien will be released from custody and paroled upon her own recognizance pending further action of the Department.

The preliminary papers in this case are transmitted herewith for your information, and should be returned with report of the hearing to be held hereunder.

The expenses incident to the execution of this warrant are hereby authorized.

For so doing, this shall be your sufficient warrant.
