# U.S. INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN GOODS AND SERVICES APRIL 2011

U.S. International Trade in Goods and Services

#### **Goods and Services**


The U.S. Census Bureau and the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis, through the Department of Commerce, announced today that total April exports of \$175.6 billion and imports of \$219.2 billion resulted in a goods and services deficit of \$43.7 billion, down from \$46.8 billion in March, revised. April exports were \$2.2 billion more than March exports of \$173.4 billion. April imports were \$1.0 billion less than March imports of \$220.2 billion.

In April, the goods deficit decreased \$3.0 billion from March to \$58.1 billion, and the services surplus increased \$0.2 billion to \$14.4 billion. Exports of goods increased \$2.0 billion to \$126.4 billion, and imports of goods decreased \$1.0 billion to \$184.5 billion. Exports of services increased \$0.2 billion to \$49.1 billion, and imports of services were virtually unchanged at \$34.7 billion.

The goods and services deficit increased \$2.2 billion from April 2010 to April 2011. Exports were up \$27.8 billion, or 18.8 percent, and imports were up \$30.0 billion, or 15.9 percent.

#### Goods (Census Basis)

The March to April increase in exports of goods reflected increases in *industrial supplies and materials* (\$2.0 billion); capital goods (\$1.2 billion); and consumer goods (\$0.3 billion). Decreases occurred in automotive vehicles, parts,



and engines (\$0.8 billion); other goods (\$0.5 billion); and foods, feeds, and beverages (\$0.2 billion).

The March to April decrease in imports of goods reflected decreases in automotive vehicles, parts, and engines (\$2.8 billion) and industrial supplies and materials (\$1.5 billion). Increases occurred in consumer goods (\$2.1 billion); capital goods (\$0.6 billion); foods, feeds, and beverages (\$0.4 billion); and other goods (\$0.2 billion).

The April 2010 to April 2011 increase in exports of goods reflected increases in *industrial supplies and materials* (\$11.2 billion); *capital goods* (\$5.1 billion); *foods, feeds, and beverages* (\$2.7 billion); *consumer goods* (\$1.6 billion); *automotive vehicles, parts, and engines* (\$1.4 billion); and *other goods* (\$0.1 billion).

NOTE: Total goods data are reported on a Balance of Payments basis, unless otherwise specified. Commodity and country detail data for goods are on a Census basis. Monthly statistics are seasonally adjusted unless otherwise specified. The April 2010 to April 2011 increase in imports of goods reflected increases in *industrial supplies and materials* (\$11.4 billion); *consumer goods* (\$6.1 billion); *capital goods* (\$5.7 billion); *automotive vehicles, parts, and engines* (\$1.6 billion); *foods, feeds, and beverages* (\$1.5 billion); and *other goods* (\$0.9 billion).

#### Services

Services exports increased \$0.2 billion from March to April. The increase reflected increases in *travel*, *other private services* (which includes items such as business, professional, and technical services, insurance services, and financial services), and *passenger fares*. Changes in the other categories of services exports were small.

Services imports were virtually unchanged from March to April. Changes in all categories of services imports were small and mostly offsetting.

The April 2010 to April 2011 increase in exports of services was \$5.3 billion. The largest increases were in *other private services* (\$2.6 billion) and *travel* (\$1.3 billion). Within *other private services*, the largest increases were in business, professional, and technical services and financial services.


The April 2010 to April 2011 increase in imports of services was \$2.1 billion. The largest increases were in *other private services* (\$0.7 billion) and *travel* (\$0.5 billion). Within *other private services*, the largest increases were in business, professional, and technical services and financial services.

#### **Goods and Services Moving Average**

For the three months ending in April, exports of goods and services averaged \$171.4 billion, while imports of goods and services averaged \$216.9 billion, resulting in an average trade deficit of \$45.5 billion. For the three months ending in March, the average trade deficit was \$46.9 billion, reflecting average exports of \$168.7 billion and average imports of \$215.7 billion.

#### Selected Not Seasonally Adjusted Goods Details

The April figures show surpluses, in billions of dollars, with Hong Kong \$2.6 (\$2.7 for March), Singapore \$1.2 (\$0.9), Australia \$1.1 (\$1.1), and Egypt \$0.5 (\$0.4). Deficits were recorded, in billions of dollars, with China \$21.6 (\$18.1), OPEC \$9.6 (\$10.8), European Union \$7.5 (\$9.0), Mexico \$5.5 (\$6.2), Germany \$3.8 (\$4.6), Japan \$3.6 (\$6.1), Ireland \$3.0 (\$2.6), Venezuela \$2.8 (\$3.0), Nigeria \$2.5,



(\$2.5), Canada \$2.5 (\$2.6), Taiwan \$1.2 (\$0.6) and Korea \$1.0 (\$0.6).

Advanced technology products exports were \$23.0 billion in April and imports were \$30.1 billion, resulting in a deficit of \$7.0 billion. April exports were \$2.2 billion less than the \$25.3 billion in March, while April imports were \$2.1 billion less than the \$32.2 billion in March.

#### Revisions

For March goods on a Census basis, not seasonally adjusted, exports were revised up \$0.3 billion and imports were revised down \$0.3 billion. Goods carry-over in April was \$0.2 billion (0.1 percent) for exports and \$0.6 billion (0.3 percent) for imports. For March, revised export carry-over and revised import carry-over were virtually zero.

For March goods on a balance of payment basis, exports were revised down \$0.5 billion and imports were revised down \$1.5 billion.

Services exports for March were revised up \$1.2 billion to \$48.9 billion, mostly reflecting an upward revision in *royalties* and license fees. Services imports were revised up \$0.9 billion to \$34.7 billion, mostly reflecting upward revisions in *royalties* and license fees, other transportation (which includes freight and port services), and travel.

Goods and services exports and imports for all months through March 2011 shown in this release reflect the incorporation of annual revisions to the goods and services series in the U.S. international transactions accounts. See the "Notice" in this release for a description of major revisions to goods and services exports and imports.

#### NOTICE

In this release and in the accompanying "U.S. International Trade in Goods and Services: Annual Revision 2010," the U.S. Census Bureau and the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) are jointly publishing revised statistics on both U.S. trade in goods and U.S. trade in services beginning with 1999. The revised statistics on goods and services will also be included in the annual revision of the <u>U.S. international transactions accounts</u> (ITAs), which BEA will release on June 16, 2011.

The annual revision has not changed the overall trend in the goods and services balance. On an annual basis, the goods and services deficit was revised less than 1 percent for nearly all years; the exception was 2009, when it was revised up 1.7 percent. For 2010, the goods and services deficit was revised up \$4.3 billion, or 0.9 percent. The goods deficit was revised down for all years; the services surplus was revised up for 1999-2007 and down for 2008-2010.

#### Goods

The 2010 not seasonally adjusted Census-basis goods statistics were revised to redistribute monthly data that arrived too late for inclusion in the month of transaction but that were included, initially, in the month in which the data were received. In addition, corrections were made to previously published 2010 statistics. Seasonal and trading-day adjustments were then recalculated, and the seasonally adjusted current-dollar series were revised beginning with 2008. The chain-weighted dollar series were also revised beginning with statistics for 2008.

Balance of payments (BOP) adjustments – adjustments that BEA applies to Census-basis goods exports and imports to convert them to a BOP basis – were revised beginning with statistics for 1999. These adjustments are combined and presented as "Net Adjustments" in this report. Adjustments to low-value exports and imports were introduced for 1999-2006 and were revised for 2007-2009. BOP adjustments for goods procured in ports were revised for exports beginning with statistics for 2007 and for imports beginning with statistics for 2004. BOP adjustments that exhibit significant seasonal patterns are now seasonally adjusted for both exports and imports beginning with statistics for 1999.

#### **Services**

Beginning with statistics for 1999, the following items were reclassified within the services accounts: fees for the rights to distribute film and television recordings from *other private services* to *royalties and license fees*; postal services from *U.S. government miscellaneous services* to *other transportation*; and cruise fares from *passenger fares* to *travel* (because cruise fares cover onboard expenditures for goods and services similar to land travel). These reclassifications are part of a multiyear effort to align the ITAs with the most recent international guidelines for international economic accounts. Information about BEA's 2011 annual revision of the ITAs and plans for implementing the new international standards were presented in the May 2011 issue of the *Survey of Current Business*.

Services exports were also revised because BEA has (1) adopted a new method for measuring expenditures in the United States of foreign residents who are working in the United States for less than one year and (2) excluded expenditures of foreign nationals who are working for international organizations located in the United States to more closely align with international guidelines. Both of these changes resulted in revisions beginning with statistics for 1999. Services imports were also revised because BEA has implemented a new method for measuring non-fuel expenditures of U.S. air carriers in foreign ports beginning with statistics for 2004.

In addition to the changes described above, services exports and imports were revised to incorporate updated source data, including newly available data from BEA's quarterly services surveys beginning with statistics for 2008 and initial results of BEA's benchmark survey of international financial services transactions beginning with statistics for 2007.

#### **Changes to Countries**

Effective with the release of May 2011 statistics on July 12, 2011, the U.S. International Trade in Goods and Services report will be revised to reflect changes to Netherlands Antilles. The new countries will be listed individually in exhibit 6 of the FT-900 supplement and added to the South/Central America country grouping in exhibit 14 of the FT-900 and exhibit 6 of the FT-900 supplement.

#### INFORMATION ON GOODS AND SERVICES

#### **GOODS (CENSUS BASIS)**

The Census basis goods data are compiled from the documents collected by the U.S. Customs and Border Protection and reflect the movement of goods between foreign countries and the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and U.S. Foreign Trade Zones. They include government and non-government shipments of goods and exclude shipments between the United States and its territories and possessions, transactions with U.S. military, diplomatic and consular installations abroad, U.S. goods returned to the United States by its Armed Forces, personal and household effects of travelers, and in-transit shipments. The General Imports value reflects the total arrival of merchandise from foreign countries that immediately enters consumption channels, warehouses, or Foreign Trade Zones.

For imports, the value reported is the U.S. Customs and Border Protection appraised value of merchandise; generally, the price paid for merchandise for export to the United States. Import duties, freight, insurance, and other charges incurred in bringing merchandise to the United States are excluded.

Exports are valued at the f.a.s. (free alongside ship) value of merchandise at the U.S. port of export, based on the transaction price including inland freight, insurance, and other charges incurred in placing the merchandise alongside the carrier at the U.S. port of exportation.

Revision policy for goods on a Census basis: Monthly data include actual month's transactions as well as a small number of transactions for previous months. Each month the U.S. Census Bureau revises the aggregate seasonally adjusted (current and chain-weighted dollar) and unadjusted export, import, and trade balance figures, as well as the end-use totals for the prior month. SITC and country detail data are not revised monthly. The timing adjustment shown in Exhibit 14 is the difference between monthly data as originally reported and as recompiled. Quarterly revisions are made to the chain-weighted dollar series. In the last month of each quarter, the current and previous quarters are revised to incorporate the Bureau of Labor Statistics' monthly revisions to price indexes, which are used to produce the chained-dollar series and to align Census data with data published by the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis in the National Income and Product Accounts. Annual revisions for the months are made in June to reflect corrections received subsequent to the monthly revisions. These revisions are reflected in totals, end-use, SITC, and country summary data. The monthly end-use, commodity, and country and area data presented in Exhibits 6-18 in this release are on a Census basis.

## U.S./CANADA DATA EXCHANGE AND SUBSTITUTION

The data for U.S. exports to Canada are derived from import data compiled by Canada. The use of Canada's import data to produce U.S. export data requires several alignments in order to compare the two series.

- Coverage Canadian imports are based on country of origin. U.S. goods shipped from a third country are included. U.S. exports exclude these foreign shipments. For April 2011, these shipments totaled \$82.0 million. U.S. export coverage also excludes U.S. postal shipments to Canada. For April 2011, these shipments totaled \$22.4 million.
  - U.S. import coverage includes shipments of railcars and locomotives from Canada. Effective with January 2004 statistics, Canada excludes these shipments from its goods exports to the United States, therefore creating coverage differences between the two countries for these goods.
- 2. Valuation Canadian imports are valued at the point of origin in the United States. However, U.S. exports are valued at the port of exit in the United States and include inland freight charges, making the U.S. export value slightly larger than the Canadian import value. Canada requires inland freight to be reported separately from the value of the goods. Combining the inland freight and the Canadian reported import value provides a consistent valuation for all U.S. exports. Inland freight charges for April 2011 accounted for 2.5 percent of the value of U.S. exports to Canada.
- 3. Reexports Unlike Canadian imports, which are based on country of origin, U.S. exports include reexports of foreign goods. Therefore, the aggregate U.S. export figure is slightly larger than the Canadian import figure. For April 2011, reexports to Canada were \$3,769.4 million.
- 4. Exchange Rate Average monthly exchange rates are applied to convert the published data to U.S. currency. For April 2011, the average exchange rate was 0.9580 Canadian dollars per U.S. dollar.
- Other There are other minor differences, which are statistically insignificant, such as rounding error.

#### Canadian Estimates

Effective with January 2001 statistics, the current month data for exports to Canada contain an estimate for late arrivals and corrections. The following month, this estimate is replaced, in the press release tables only, with the actual value of late receipts and corrections. This estimate improves the current month data for exports to Canada and treats late receipts for exports to Canada in a manner more consistent with the treatment of late receipts for exports to other countries.

#### Nonsampling errors

The goods data are a complete enumeration of documents collected by the U.S. Customs and Border Protection and are not subject to sampling errors. Quality assurance procedures are performed at every stage of collection, processing and tabulation; however, the data are still subject to several types of nonsampling errors. The most significant of these include reporting errors, undocumented shipments, timeliness, data capture errors, and errors in the estimation of low-valued transactions.

Reporting Errors: Reporting errors are mistakes or omissions made by importers, exporters or their agents in their import or export declarations. Most errors involve missing or invalid commodity classification codes and missing or incorrect quantities or shipping weights. They have a negligible effect on aggregate import, export and balance of trade statistics. However, they can affect the detailed commodity statistics.

Undocumented Shipments: Federal regulations require importers, exporters or their agents to report all merchandise shipments above established exemption levels. The U.S. Census Bureau has determined that not all required documents are filed, particularly for exports.

Timeliness and Data Capture Errors: The U.S. Census Bureau captures import and export information from administrative documents and through various automated collection programs. Documents may be lost, and data may be incorrectly keyed, coded or recorded. Transactions may be included in a subsequent month's statistics if received late.

Low-valued Transactions: The total values of transactions valued as much as or below \$2,500 for exports and \$2,000 (\$250 for certain quota items) for imports are estimated for each country, using factors based on the ratios of low-valued shipments to individual country totals for past periods.

The U.S. Census Bureau recommends that data users incorporate this information into their analyses, as nonsampling errors could impact the conclusion drawn from the results. Goods are initially classified under the Harmonized System, which describes and measures the characteristics of goods traded. Combining trade into approximately 140 export and 140 import end-use categories makes it possible to examine goods according to their principal uses (See Exhibits 7 and 8). These categories are used as the basis for computing the seasonal and working-day adjusted data. These adjusted data are then summed to the six end-use aggregates for publication (Exhibit 6). These data are provided to the U.S. Bureau of Economic

Analysis, from the U.S. Census Bureau, for use in the Balance of Payments and the National Income and Product Accounts.

The seasonal adjustment procedure is based on a model that estimates the monthly movements as percentages above or below the general level of each end-use commodity series (unlike other methods that redistribute the actual series values over the calendar year). Because of the extremely variable movements of the data series for aircraft, users studying data trends may wish to analyze aircraft separately from other trade.

#### Adjustments for Price Change

Data adjusted for seasonal variation on a chained-dollar basis (2005 base year) are presented in Exhibits 10 and 11. This adjustment for price change is done using the Fisher chain-weighted methodology. The deflators are primarily based upon the monthly price indexes published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics using techniques developed for the National Income and Product Accounts by the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis.

#### SITC Data

Goods data appearing in Exhibit 15 are classified in terms of the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) Revision 3. Agricultural goods consist of non-marine food products and other products of agriculture which have not passed through complex processes of manufacture, such as raw hides and skins, fats and oils, and wine. A few goods such as essential oils, starches, casein, and albumin, considered to be agricultural by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, have been excluded from agricultural goods and are included in manufactured goods where they are classified in the SITC.

Manufactured goods conform to the SITC sections that include chemicals and related products; manufactured goods classified chiefly by material; machinery and transport equipment; miscellaneous manufactured articles; and goods and transactions not classified elsewhere.

Reexports are foreign merchandise entering the country as imports, and at the time of exportation are in substantially the same condition as when imported. Reexports, included in overall export totals, appear as separate line items in Exhibit 15.

#### Advanced Technology Products (ATP)

About 500 of some 22,000 commodity classification codes used in reporting U.S. merchandise trade are identified as "advanced technology" codes and they meet the following criteria:

- 1. The code contains products whose technology is from a recognized high technology field (e.g., biotechnology).
- These products represent leading edge technology in that field.
- 3. Such products constitute a significant part of all items covered in the selected classification code.

The aggregation of the goods results in a measure of advanced technology trade which appears in Exhibits 16 and 16A. This product and commodity-based measure of advanced technology differs from broader NAICS industry-based measures which include all goods produced by a particular industry group, regardless of the level of technology embodied in the goods.

#### GOODS (BALANCE OF PAYMENTS BASIS)

Goods on a Census basis are adjusted by the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) to a balance of payments basis to align the data with the concepts and definitions used to prepare the international and national economic accounts. adjustments, which are applied separately to exports and imports, are necessary to supplement coverage of the Census data, to eliminate duplication of transactions recorded elsewhere in the international accounts, and to value transactions according to a standard definition. They include both additions to and deductions from goods on a Census basis and are presented in this release as "Net Adjustments." Adjustments that exhibit significant seasonal patterns are seasonally adjusted. BEA also publishes more detailed quarterly and annual statistics for Net Adjustments in a standard table of the U.S. international transactions accounts, Table 2. U.S. Trade in Goods. (See the BEA Web site at http://www.bea.gov/international/bp\_web or the January, April, July, and October issues of the Survey of Current Business).

The export adjustments include:

Exports under U.S. military sales contracts - This adjustment reflects the net amount of two separate adjustments. BEA first deducts goods identified in the Census data as exports under the U.S. Foreign Military Sales program. BEA then adds primary source data for these exports, which are reported to BEA by the U.S. Department of Defense.

Gold exports, nonmonetary - This addition is made for gold that is purchased by foreign official agencies from private dealers in the United States and held at the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. The Census data only include gold that leaves the U.S. customs territory.

Goods procured in U.S. ports by foreign carriers - This *addition* is made for foreign air and ocean carriers' fuel purchases in U.S. ports.

**Low-value transactions -** This *addition* is made to phase in a revised Census Bureau methodology for low-value goods for statistics prior to 2010. The revised Census methodology was implemented for goods on a Census basis beginning with statistics for 2010.

Other adjustments to exports include:

Deductions for equipment repairs (parts and labor), developed motion picture film, and military grant-aid. Additions for sales of fish caught in U.S. territorial waters, exports of electricity to Mexico, private gift parcels, and vessels and oil rigs for which ownership changes.

The import adjustments include:

Gold imports, nonmonetary - This addition is made for gold sold by foreign official agencies to private purchasers out of stock held at the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. The Census data only include gold that enters the U.S. customs territory.

Goods procured in foreign ports by U.S. carriers - This addition is made for U.S. air and ocean carriers' fuel purchases in foreign ports.

Imports by U.S. military agencies - This adjustment reflects the net amount of two separate adjustments. BEA first deducts goods (petroleum and non-petroleum) identified in the Census data as imports by U.S. military agencies. BEA then adds primary source data for purchases of petroleum abroad by U.S. military agencies, which are reported to BEA by the U.S. Department of Defense. Non-petroleum imports are included, along with imports of services by U.S. military agencies, in the services category direct defense expenditures.

Inland freight in Canada and Mexico - This addition is made for inland freight in Canada and Mexico. Imports of goods from all countries should be valued at the customs value—the value at the foreign port of export including inland freight charges. For imports from Canada and Mexico, this should be the cost of the goods at the U.S. border. However, the customs value for imports for certain Canadian and Mexican goods is the point of origin in Canada or Mexico. BEA makes an addition for the inland freight charges of transporting these goods to the U.S. border to make the value comparable to the customs value reported for imports from other countries.

**Low-value transactions -** This *addition* is made to phase in a revised Census Bureau methodology for low-value goods for statistics prior to 2010. The revised Census methodology was implemented for goods on a Census basis beginning with statistics for 2010.

Other adjustments to imports include:

Deductions for equipment repairs (parts and labor), repairs to U.S. vessels abroad, and developed motion picture film. Additions for non-reported imports of locomotives and railcars, imports of electricity from Mexico, conversion of vessels for commercial use, and valuation of software imports at market value.

#### **SERVICES**

The services statistics cover transactions between foreign countries and the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and other U.S. territories and possessions. Transactions with U.S. military, diplomatic, and consular installations abroad are excluded because these installations are considered to be part of the U.S. economy.

Services statistics are based on quarterly, annual, and benchmark surveys and information obtained from monthly government and industry reports. Services are seasonally adjusted when statistically significant seasonal patterns are present. No monthly country or area detail is available due to the lack of adequate source data.

Services are shown in seven broad categories. The types of services for exports and imports are the same for six of the categories. For the seventh, the export category is *transfers under U.S. military sales contracts* and the import category is *direct defense expenditures*. The following is a brief description of the types of services included in each category:

**Travel** - Purchases of services and goods by U.S. travelers abroad and by foreign visitors to the United States. A traveler is defined as a person who stays for a period of less than 1 year in a country of which the person is not a resident. Includes cruise fares and expenditures for food, lodging, recreation, gifts, and other items incidental to a foreign visit.

Passenger fares - Fares paid by residents of one country to transportation carriers of other countries. Receipts consist of fares received by U.S. carriers from foreign residents for travel between the United States and foreign countries and between two foreign points. Payments consist of fares paid by U.S. residents to foreign carriers for travel between the United States and foreign countries. Excludes cruise fares, which are included in *travel*.

Other transportation - Transactions include freight charges for the transportation of goods to and from the United States by ocean, air, waterway, pipeline, and rail carriers, operating expenses that transportation companies incur in foreign ports, postal services, and payments for vessel charter and aircraft rentals with crew. Excludes air and ocean carriers' fuel purchases in foreign ports, which are included in exports and imports of goods on a balance of payments (BOP) basis.

Royalties and license fees - Transactions for the rights to use, the rights to reproduce or distribute, and the outright sale of intellectual property such as patents, techniques, processes, formulas, designs, know-how, trademarks, copyrights, franchises, and manufacturing rights. The term "royalties" generally refers to payments for the use of copyrights or trademarks; the term "license fees" generally refers to payments for the use of patents or industrial processes. Includes fees for the rights to distribute film and television recordings. Includes transactions with both affiliated (related parties) and unaffiliated foreign residents.

Other private services - Transactions consist of education services: financial services (includes fees and commissions and excludes investment income); insurance services; telecommunications services (includes transmission services and value-added services); business, professional, and technical services (includes advertising services; computer and data processing services; database and other information services; research, development, and testing services; management, consulting, and public relations services; legal services; construction services; architectural and engineering services; mining services; industrial engineering services; installation, maintenance, and repair of equipment; and medical services); and other services. Includes transactions with both affiliated (related parties) and unaffiliated foreign residents.

Transfers under U.S. military sales contracts (Exports only) - Transactions include exports of services, such as training services and repair services, provided by U.S. government military agencies through grants and the U.S. Foreign Military Sales (FMS) program. Includes exports of goods that are commingled in the source data and cannot be separately identified. Excludes exports of goods under the FMS program, which are included in exports of goods on a BOP basis.

Direct defense expenditures (Imports only) - Transactions include expenditures by U.S. military agencies abroad, including expenditures by U.S. personnel, payments of wages to foreign residents, construction expenditures, payments for foreign contractual services, and procurement of foreign goods. Excludes petroleum purchases abroad, which are included in imports of goods on a BOP basis.

U.S. government miscellaneous services - Transactions of U.S. government nonmilitary agencies with foreign residents. Most of these transactions involve the provision of services to, or purchases of services from, foreigners. Some goods transactions are also included.

Revision policy for goods on a balance of payments basis and for services: Each month, a preliminary estimate for the current month and a revised estimate for the immediately preceding month are released. After the initial revision, no

further revisions are made to a month until more data complete source become available in March, June, September, and December. The releases in March, June, September, and December contain revised estimates for the previous SIX The release in months. March also contains revisions for all months of the previous year in order to align the seasonally adjusted monthly data with annual totals. The release in June also contains annual revisions, which reflect updated source data,
