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MR. GRAY: Well, your Honor, a couple of 1 2 reasons, I think. The first is that the agencies have been working diligently on the matter and simply haven't been able to 5 complete the production. And we are 6 attempting very much to work with the states so that we can provide all of the information 7 8 that we can provide and that the states are seeking and make reasoned decisions under the 9 regulation and after gathering and reviewing 10 what is really an extraordinary amount of 11 12 documents for each of these agencies. And

13 the fact of the matter is despite devoting significant amounts of time to it, none of 14 15 the agencies, I believe, have been able to

16 finish at this point. And the extra time 17 will aid us in reviewing -- gathering,

reviewing these documents, deciding what can 18 be released, applying the regulations in the 19 way they're meant to be applied, and then 20

serving the states. 21 22 SPECIAL MASTER LANCASTER: Can you guarantee or represent to me that if I should 23

grant your request, it will be the last one? MR. GRAY: I cannot make any such THE REPORTING GROUP Mason & Lockhart

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1 guarantee at this point. The agencies are 2 working. They will try to get it done. But 3 there's -- it's a significant list, 4 particularly for the Corps. As you know reviewing the documents, the

5 breadth of the request, it may be an 6 exaggeration, but it's one that has asked for 7 pretty much anything the Mobile District has 8 9 done since 1975. And pulling back and gathering and reviewing and figuring that out 10 11 while at the same time trying to complete the 12 Corps' primary mission here, which is to 13 revise the master manuals, as we said in the 14 letter, is simply too much. And the Corps 15 has undertaken to hire outside folks who are retired folks from the Mobile District to

17 come in and review these. But I don't want to mislead and say that 18 we'll definitely get it done in 45 days 20 because I don't know if that's true. I think 21 it's going to significantly aid in our efforts to get this done. And if the states 22 23 will work with us to narrow these requests, 24 if they want to get it done by 45 days, that would -- that would help significantly.

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SPECIAL MASTER LANCASTER: Mr. Gray, if 1 I understand your submission correctly, you don't care whether I give you the 45 days or not because you don't have to pay any 5 attention to whatever I say. Is that 6 correct? 7 MR. GRAY: Well, I think that may

overstate it slightly. I think that if 8 the -- if you deny the 45 days, then it will 9 be, you know, up to the states to file a 10 motion to compel. And I think we would have 11 12 very good defenses in any proceedings on that motion because of the Touhy case itself. 13

But, you know, the consequence of that, bringing the dispute to the head in that way, may be that the states end up getting far less than they would have hoped for from us. And I think it's better to avoid the need to have that fight at this point in time, particularly since the states haven't objected to the 45 days.

And we -- we can, hopefully, satisfy the states during that time period and then, if it's necessary, fight about whether a motion to compel can be granted or you would have to THE REPORTING GROUP

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ifile an APA suit as we -- as we have maintained. I think, you know, now is really 2 3 not the time to fight about that.

4 SPECIAL MASTER LANCASTER: Well, if I'm reading what you wrote, you said neither

the -- this is a quote, neither the 30-day 6 7 nor the 120-day deadlines contained in the

subpoenas control the Agency's processing of 8

the Touhy request under the applicable

federal regulations. And the United States 10

11 would oppose enforcement of either the 30-day 12

or the 120-day deadline. That's your position?

13 14 MR. GRAY: That is our position. And we have asked for the -- we have asked for the 45 days and tried to accommodate the states 16 17 in these proceedings and to avoid the need for you, and ultimately the Court, to have to 18 19

decide that issue. 20 The Touhy issue is a complicated issue. I think we have good arguments there. I'm 22 not necessarily prepared to lay them all out today; but I think if there were an

23 enforcement proceeding, we would have very 24 good defenses. And it's better at this point

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to -- to attempt to work with the states

until it's absolutely necessary to reach that dispute. 3

4 SPECIAL MASTER LANCASTER: So what if I do nothing? 5

MR. GRAY: If you do nothing, we will 6 continue our Touhy process in the way that we 7

have done; and it will be up to the states to

decide at what point they are tired of 9

waiting and want to file a motion to compel, 10 11 I suppose.

SPECIAL MASTER LANCASTER: Thank you 12 13 very much.

14 Florida, do you want to add anything to Mr. Gray's comments? 15

MR. WINSOR: No, your Honor. 16

17 This is Allen Winsor. We laid out our position in the status report. And 18

certainly, we are mindful of the issue the 19

United States is facing; and we do not oppose 20 the 45-day extension. 21
